

## SOUTHERN G. O. P. WISHED TO BONE BY PARTY BOSSSES

In Future National Conventions of Republican Party South Will Furnish Only 16 Per Cent of Delegates.

## TEN DELEGATES LOST BY GEORGIA G. O. P.

And Other Southern States Lose in Proportion—The Southern Delegates Under New Plan Will Total 164.

Washington, December 17.—The republican national committee tonight concluded its labor for reform in party procedure, and launched its campaign for a reunion of warring elements, by adopting a resolution providing for a total abolition in the next national convention of the southern states.

## Action Made Unanimous.

The action of the committee, criticized in vigorous terms by several of its members, but made unanimous by the overwhelming majority of the delegates, was to cut the southern states out of the party.
