GERMAN ATTACKS ON BEZURA RIVER STOP.

Berlin, December 26.—(By Wireless to London.)—The German official statement on the progress of the war, given in Berlin this afternoon, relates that German successes in the western area of the war, British and French attacks near Nieuport, have been repulsed. The statement refers to the capture of the British ship, the *Albatross*, on the Beaura river and was successful on the Beaura river and was successful on the Beaura river.

The text of the announcement follows: "Near Nieuport, during the night of December 24-25, attacks delivered by English and French troops were repulsed. The success of the battle with English and Indian contingents near St. Hubert can be better judged today. Russian officers were captured and taken prisoners, while fourteen machine guns, twenty rifles and other war material was captured. The enemy left more than 1,000 dead on the field. The English asked for a cessation of hostilities to bury the dead. Our troops were comparatively unscathed. Some minor engagements have taken place at Lihon, near the town of Amiens, and at Tracy-la-Vie, north of Compiègne. We captured 300 prisoners.

Battles in the Vosges. "Near Dieulouard, in Upper Alsace, west of Bismarck, and in the Vosges, near the southwest of Altkirch, there were minor engagements yesterday, but the situation remains unchanged. The evening of December 25, a French airplane threw nine bombs on the town of Dieulouard. No troops were stationed at this place; there was only a small garrison. The airplane was not damaged. No damage of consequence was done. In reply to this aerial attack and also the throwing of bombs on the open town of Freiburg, which is not defended, the German army, none of operations, German airplanes threw three medium sized bombs into the outskirts of Nancy.

NAPOLEON, THE RUINER AND THE BUILDER IN THE PATH OF NAPOLEON

100 Years After
His Downfall

By JAMES MORGAN

A Journey of 20,000 Miles

Napoleon's most useful and enduring victories were won in peace, not in war.

Mr. Morgan's story today opens in the Paris of Napoleon, the city modernized and beautified at his command, and follows the Emperor over France and throughout the Empire in campaigns of construction no less amazing and far more inspiring than his campaigns of destruction. Read how the heir of the Great Revolution bridged and united rivers, opened harbors, erected monuments, leveled the Alps, uprooted serfdom from Gibraltar to Warsaw and spread the principle of equality before the law; broke the fetters of the Jew, established religious freedom, and, sweeping aside the barriers of the past, opened the way everywhere to modern progress.

More blood has been spilt in the streets of Paris to overthrow monarchies than on any other equal space of earth, and yet those streets all seem as if they surely must lead up to a throne. London, in whose narrow, tangled ways confusion reigns and there is no sign of the presence of a king, expresses English freedom and English individualism. But its sister city across the channel plainly is a made-to-order town and the prettily arranged stage setting of a court. The boulevard, the lined boulevards, with their miles and miles of windows and mansard roofs on a symmetrical level, with their airy vistas of splendid palaces and churches and monuments, wear an air of regal magnificence that mocks the French republic in its own capital and ridicules the republican simplicity of a president.

Napoleon, at the height of the empire, stamped his image upon the city and made it his monument. The empire fell and rose only to fall again. Bourbons and Orientals have come and gone. The commune tossed to its fatal fever. The republic lived and died and has been born again through all its vicissitudes. Paris has remained unchangingly imperial. For art is long and beauty endures. Although the British metropolis, with population of 1,100,000 in 1912, was twice the size of the French metropolis, Napoleon boasted that "London is a center of the world, Paris is the center of the world." He resented at once to make himself the Caesar and his capital the home of the modern world. Wars delayed and his downfall defeated many of his plans, but the second empire took up the unfinished work of the first and completed the transformation of the city from a dingy, medieval town.

THE PARIS OF NAPOLEON.

Napoleon enlarged the palace of the Louvre, which 180 years before had been built in the field by the Gauls, where the wolf hunters met, and he provided it with the art of the world. It held the greatest collection of paintings ever assembled under one roof. From the windows of the adjoining palace of the Tuilleries, which 250 years before had been erected among the tile kilns, he looked out on the "copper yard" of Paris, where the housewives came to see their washing in the river. On the other side of the palace he found himself shut in by a lot of old convents all manner of remarkable buildings.

He cleared the river bank and lined it with broad quays. He tore away the huddle of unsightly structures at the palace gate and replaced them with what is still one of the most important and imposing architectural features of the city. He opened a magnificent street from the Seine for nearly two miles, he created it for the traffic of the world, and he made it a model for the streets of the world.

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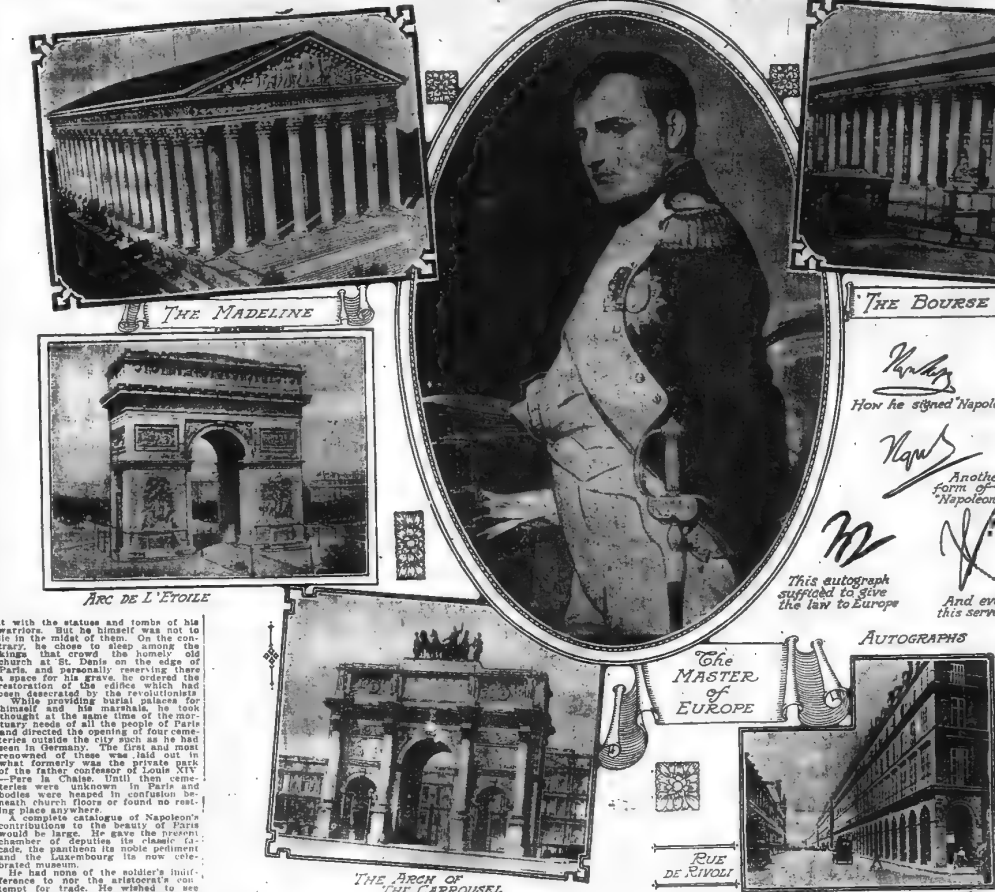

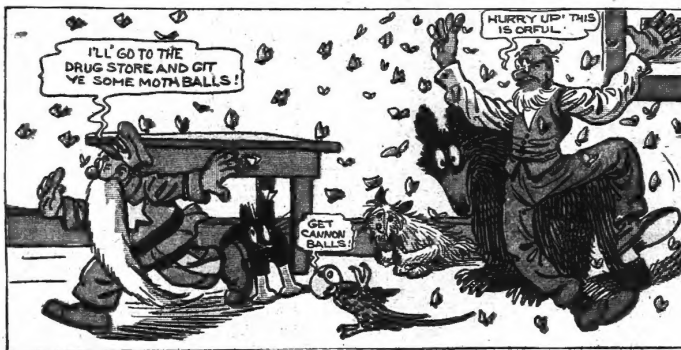
