

RUSS FORCES OF "URGENT USE" OF "MILITARY USE"

French Advance in Argonne and Alsace, But There Is Little Change Elsewhere on Western Front.

HARD FIGHT CONTINUES ALONG THE RIVER PILICA

German Attacks on Bzura and Rawka Rivers Being Made With Artillery—Car Is at Front.

London, December 27.—(Except in the Argonne and Alsace, where the French have made some progress, and outside of artillery practice, the battle in the west for the last two days largely consisted of German attacks, to counter those of the allies and to prevent the allies from organizing the ground they had gained.

In Poland, where the Russian emperor has joined Grand Duke Nicholas at Russian headquarters, the German attacks on the Bzura and Rawka rivers are being made almost exclusively with artillery, while an offensive in the west has been assumed further south along the River Pilica, where hard fighting continues and both sides claim to have inflicted heavy losses.

The Russians apparently have again gained ascendancy over the Austrians in South Poland and Galicia. The Austrians admit the loss of the towns of Jaslo and Krosno, on the south Galician railway, which they occupy from across the Carpathians, recaptured a week or more ago.

The Russian report tonight is the result of a series of victories from middle Poland to the foot hills of the Carpathians. It records the capture of 15,500 prisoners and a number of guns, and unless some prisoners have been counted more than once, the Russian have taken 30,000 Austrian prisoners since they resumed their drive in the Black river.

General Education Board Reports on Work Directed by Federal Government, But Financed by Board.

New York, December 27.—Results of the Girls' Canning club movement in the southern states, promoted jointly by the department of agriculture and the general education board, are detailed in an installment of the latter organization's annual report made public today.

The method is simple, says the report. "Each girl takes one-tenth of an acre and is taught how to use the seed, to plant, cultivate and harvest, to grow crops for the home, and trained teachers of domestic science instruct the local teachers in the best methods. When the tomatoes are ripe the girls come together, now at one home and now at another, to can the product. It is done in the school, the girls are taught the necessity of scrupulous cleanliness, the girls are taught to use a can, seal and label, and indeed manufacture an easily marketable product."

Three hundred and twenty-five girls were registered the first year, three hundred and twenty-five the second year, in 1913 there were upward of thirty thousand in four states.

The entire expense of the Girls' Canning club work has at all times been borne by the general education board. The first contribution, in 1911 an initial appropriation of \$5,000 was made. The following year, in May, 1912, the appropriation of the board for this purpose was \$7,000.

Members Intend to Complete Budget for the Year. Confident Bond Issue Election Will Be Ordered.

There will be a meeting of the finance committee of the education board on Tuesday afternoon for the purpose of completing the budget of the school department for 1915. At the last meeting of the committee the heads of the department for the new year were estimated to be about \$170,000, but since that time it is understood that a number of matters were considered and when these were added to the statement the grand total will be about \$180,000.

Members of the board and members of the general committee who have made a thorough investigation of the needs of the school department are more confident that the complete rehabilitation of the entire system cannot be even attempted with less than \$1,000,000, the amount provided for use of the school department in the present bond ordinance drafted by the Attorney General J. M. Mayson and which will be presented to the council on the first Monday in January.

In the interim before the first meeting of the new council, the heads of the bond issue are carrying on their campaign among the voters, teachers and the public, and according to reports which are being made to the finance committee of the board, the school department has been successful in securing the necessary amount of money for the year.

The various other projects provided for in the bond issue have also had the effect of stirring up interest. The water department must have money for a new consulting basin, and all schools are in need of a greater interest in the water supply.

At the present time the city is having difficulty in making the supply from the river adequate for all purposes, and the fact that Atlanta has not suffered in the recent past is due to the efficiency of General Manager Smith and his assistants in charge of the water department and the watchfulness of the water board.

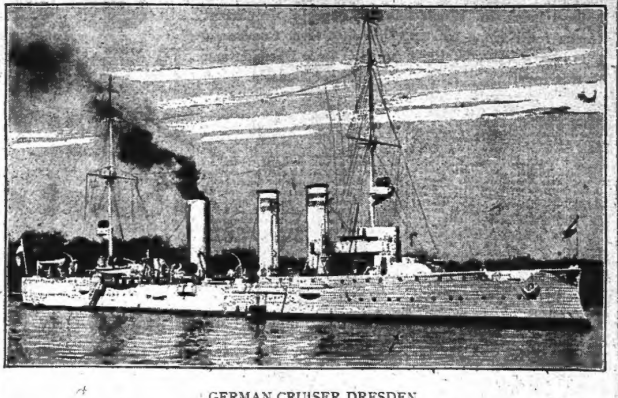
SAYS HE WAS ROBBED BY THREE WHITE MEN
