London, August 13.—Field Marshal von Hindenburg has taken personal command of the German army attacking Kovno, and, according to tonight's German official report, has repulsed the Russian attack on that city. The Russian attack on that city was repulsed by the German army.

The selection of Germany's national hero for the duty of capturing Kovno, which stands between Petrograd and Vilna and the Warsaw-Petrograd railway, indicates the importance the German general staff attaches to this operation.

### KOVNO AND VILNA STOUTLY DEFENDED.

News that the civilians had commenced to evacuate Kovno as well as Vilna had led to the belief in many quarters that the Russians either had decided to give them up or had no hope of holding these points. Now, however, it is believed that the Germans are said to be doing little more than holding their own, so the talked-of advance toward Petrograd seems to be developing very slowly.

On the other hand, the Germans continue to drive the Russians northward east of Warsaw, and the advance of Siedlece, are within a short distance of the Bug river, one of the main supports of the Brest-Litovsk line.

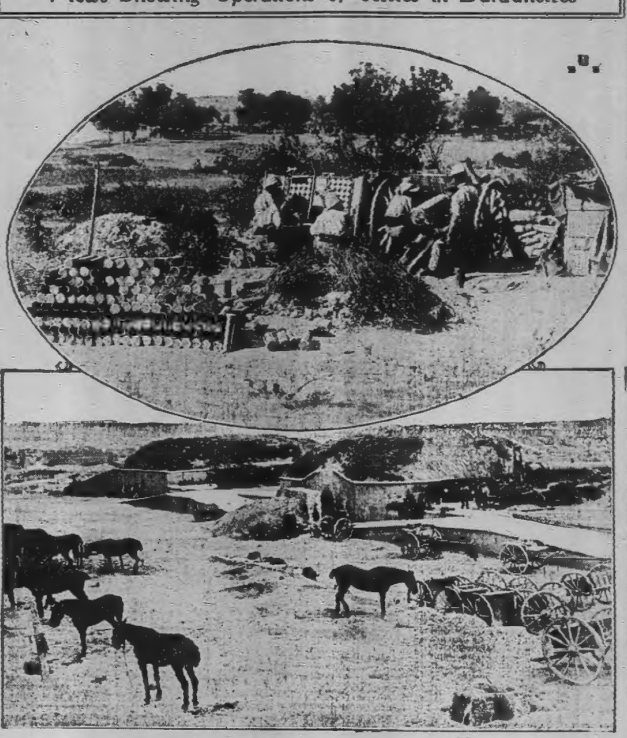
