State Department Learns That Europe Will Revolutionize Her Naval Policy in the Western Hemisphere.

TO PANAMA CANAL

MOVE INVOLVES LIFE OF MONROE DOCTRINE

Great Britain to Establish Great Naval Base in the Bermudas and Germany Seeks a Foothold.

Washington, August 3 .- Reen interst has been aroused in official circles here by the report reaching the state department that Great Britain is contemplating a great naval base in the Bermuda islands. It is authoritatively stated that the British government has made inquiry concerning the plans of the United States for protection of the Panama canal routes, and it has been suggested that this indicates ar intention to safeguard British shipping through the isthmus as is done in the Mediterranean.

Problem a Tremendous One.

Officials realize that the problem raised is a tremendous one, involving as it may, the very life of the Monroe doctrine and marking, perhaps, a complete revolution in foreign navai policy in the western hemisphere, for i changes her naval policy in American Atlantic waters, other European na-tions probably will follow suit. White these changes may be expected in the Atlantic waters and the West Indias opening of the canal, the United States must contend with Japan for domination of the Pacific.

The British royal navy abandoned its naval stations in this country about ten years ago, when the United States gave up the idea of the construction of the Nicaraguan canal, and set about digging the big waterway across Panama, whose approaching completion bids fair to revolutionize international relations.

Present British Stations Apart from its West Indian stations, the royal navy maintained stations at Esquimault, British Columbia, and Hal-

ZACHRY WILL OPPOSE CAROLINA REQUISITION

Fair and Complete Hearing Will Be Given by Governor Slaton.

Responding to the request of Mayor E. D. Cleary and forty citizens. Governor Slaton declared last night that he will accord Julian Zachry, of Harlem, Ga., a full hearing before he honors the requisition Governor Cole Blease, of South Carolina, has issued for the return of the prisoner to Columbia county.

"Every accused is entitled to a hearing before being returned on requisition papers." Governor Slaton said. "Friends of Zachry need have no fear that he will not get from me a fair and complete hearing."

Governor Slaton sent his assurances to Mayor Cleary Sunday afternoon.

Zachry is charged, according to the telegram sent to Governor Slaton by Governor Blease, with being a fugitive from justice. The charge, it is alleged, grew out of the separation of Zachry from his wife, who is now in Columbia, S. C. Zachry instituted habeas corpus proceedings in South Carolina, and was awarded the custody of his eldest child, Frances Mrs. Zachry fought the officers when they took the child from her. Zachry carried the little one out of the state of South Carolina.

Despite its tiny size, the common fly is a monster infinitely more deadly than any of the extinct beasts of pre-historic times. There are about twelve varieties of flies known in Georgia, but they are all alike in the respect that they carry disease.

The most common fly of all is the ordinary housefly, called the musca domestica by scientists—and by various other names by the baldhoaded man. This fly, familiar to everybody, comprises about 58 per cent of the flies found in garbage cans. dining rooms, stables, kitchens and so on. The remaining 2 per cent of flies in Georgia is principally made up of the bluebottle fly, sometimes called the blow fly or meat fly. But they are all disease breeders alike.

The fly has the most filthy habits of any living creature. He doesn't care where he gets his meals or what he eats. He had just as soon eat the bread and vegetables and meat on your plate, and he had equally as soon have some nauscating and unspeakable kind of filth—which is just where the trouble lies. If the fly would stick to either kind of dict, he would not he so dangerous. But the trouble is a fly will make part of his meal on some abominable refuse and a minute afterwards, unless you keep him from it, will fly in through your window and make his dessert on your jam or rice pudding, or on the baby's milk bottle, lie will wipe his dirty feet on it and leave the disease germs he brought from fith.

WARFARE BY AEROPLANE

Reports from Mexico as well as from the Ball an states do not indicate that avia tion has reached the practical stage in Warfar It is true that some planming stories came out of the near east connect ing the aeroplane with swift and sudden destruction but what was actually accomplished fell far below expectations. The reports from Mexico of the blowing up of a Mexican gunboat by an aviator are now corrected and it seems that while the operator dropped hombs all around the vescel he was unable to hit it

There is little doubt that the aeroplane will eventually prove more effective on land than on sea. It is much easier to strike a stationary target than one which is constantly bobbing as is a ship. And aircraft could sail over cities and march ing armies and work havoe. But it is not in evidence from the battles on either side of the world that the science of marks manship from the air has as yet reached perfection

It would have been interesting to ob serve results had the combatants in the Balkans or in Mexico been able to com mand a dirigible balloon such as one of the Zeppelin type. A Zeppelin is under almost perfect control of its operators which is far from true with a heavier than air machine, and could naturally be ex pected to prove a more certain factor in warfare While it is certain that in the future the airship must be reckoned with practical experience has not vet up to the present, vindicated many of the wild prophecies uttered in this direction

FINANCING THE CROPS

Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo is to be commended upon his decision to bring government money to the aid of marketing the great staple crops of the country. He has announced that between twenty five and fifty millions will be at once deposited in the banks of the south and the middle west. In the south the money will be used for moving cotton. In the middle and northwest wheat will be the beneficiary of the government deposits One of the most significant features of the announcement is that which provides that prime commercial paper may be accepted as security The practice is common abroad and is in fact one of the factors that makes for the desirable fluidity of Luropean banking systems and it lacks the inflexibility of our own system. But it is being tried for the first time in this coun try and probably foreshadows the eventual permanent adoption by the United States of this method of giving elasticity to the

Under our old fashioned and inefficient currency system the financiers of America have anticipated the approach of each autumn with more or less dread. It is then that money in huge sums must be forthcoming for financing the staple crops of the country. By an illogical and un natural paradox it has often happened that the coming or great crops which in them selves spell prosperity has caused the most tension since the larger the crop the more pressing and universal the demand for money

Bankers in the south and west had been concerned especially about the forthcoming fall since the promise of the harvest is a large one and the money available none too generous. The action of Secretary McAdoo will materially relieve the situal tion and ought to remove the last fictitious argument against a healthy fall and winter for business

THE STANDARD BALE

Of interest to every farmer in the south is the fact that effective September 1 1913 the railroads and steamship companies will demand that cotton delivered to them for shipment conform to a specified standard size and wrapping. The new resolutions require that henceforth hales must measure by a standard size of 2 x54 inches must be thoroughly covered must not be wet soiled or stained and second hand bagging must not be used

If any of these provisions are violated the recenting agent will so note on the bill of lading A notation of that character is a flaw on the bill which then becomes non negotiable in other words the farmer holding such a fault, bill is embarrassed in securing credit if he is able to secure it at all These facts had hest be understood at once as the new ruling affects the entire crop of 191314 and will if disregarded visit serious loss and complications upon the growers of the south

It is time that some systematic effort was being made to force uniformity in bal ing upon the farmers and ginners Cotton the most valuable item on America's list of exports has always been the most scan dalously mishandled of the lot. There has been little or no effort at uniformity or securing or even approximate cleanliness in wrapping The resultant thirty pounds of tare to the bale now deducted from the market price is largely chargeable to this condition In the past ten years it is likely this one item of tare has cost the south in the neighborhood of \$450 000 000 a clear loss and one that is distinctly avoidable

Cotton properly baled and cared for is worth several dollars a bale more than that handled under the present system Certainly that amount is worth working for The need of the moment, however, is that the farmer should realize the effect of the regulations to be en forced this fall by the carriers Unless they do the cost of handling the crop al ways visited in the last analysis on the farmer, will this year substantially reduce the margin of profits
