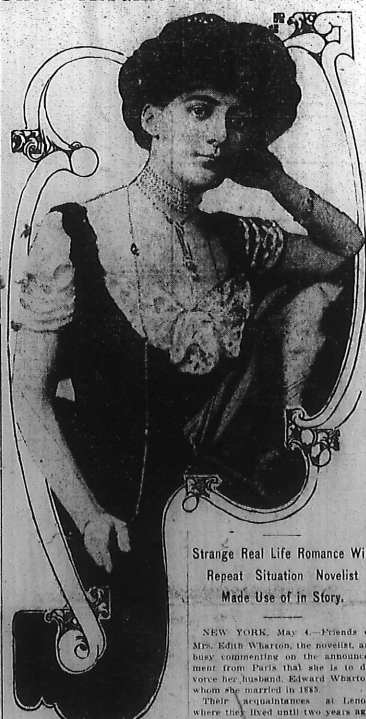

JUDGE W. D. ELLIS CHARGES GRAND JURY TO UPRIDE PHAGAN SLAYING MYSTERY

Urges Enforcement of Laws Regulating Locker Clubs and Against Sunday Tippling, Questionable Houses and Carrying Concealed Weapons

Judge W. D. Ellis of the Superior Court, delivered the following address to the new Grand Jury, and touched upon the Phagan case.

"Under our system of judicial procedure we have in the Superior Court of this county six terms each year. Grand juries are drawn and impaneled at each term but the duties of making investigations into matters of a general nature, such as the inspection of the office, the books, papers and records of the clerk of the Superior Court, of the Ordinary and of the County Surveyor, the duty of examination of public buildings and their condition, the examinations of the lists of voters and the examination of convicts committed, the inspection of the jail and camp, other matters concerning the public welfare, the peace and good order of the county at large, are required at the March and September terms.

While such matters are looked after by the grand jury, the terms named, yet you are not prohibited from inquiring into such matters if you deem it necessary, or if brought to your attention by the court or the Solicitor General.

Cites Violation of Liquor Law.

You are impaneled at this term especially to inquire into and take action upon cases of violation of the penal code. While you are to consider all violations of the law, and bring to light by presentment or indictment all who are probably guilty of crime, it will call your special attention to some matters.

Look to the violation of the law against the sale of intoxicating liquors. Find true bills against all who conduct clubs, which are run for the purpose of selling intoxicating liquor, and which are run under the law, locker clubs can be operated, if a club is organized or maintained for the purpose of making money by the sale of intoxicating liquors, then those who organize, maintain it or are in violation of the law should be punished. It is considered as such a violation of the law that the members may keep liquor as a part of their club, but if they sell or make of intoxicating liquor in the purpose and the actual fact only in such cases for the organization or operation of a club are guilty and should be brought to trial.

I want again to call your special attention to tippling houses. In the houses on the Sabbath day, which are run for the purpose of selling intoxicating liquor, and which are run under the law, locker clubs can be operated, if a club is organized or maintained for the purpose of making money by the sale of intoxicating liquors, then those who organize, maintain it or are in violation of the law should be punished. Joseph M. Brown, Governor of Georgia, on Saturday night gave to Hearst's Sunday American the following ringing and significant interview in respect of the Phagan murder mystery:

By JOSEPH M. BROWN, Governor of Georgia.

I DESIRE to commend, with all the emphasis at my command, The Hearst newspapers' suggestion to the people of Atlanta and Georgia that they remember the sanctity and majesty of the law of the land, and the sure operation of justice through the courts, in contemplating a recent horrible and unrepeatable crime committed in our midst.

I commend all newspapers, and persons, and influences, and things that hold fast to the law in times of anxious suspense, and when wild and irresponsible rumor runs riot in a community.

We must hold ever in mind that the people have established the processes of law, and that those processes work through the courts, with judges and juries.
