In a cartoon printed several days ago our artist showed the Panama Canal with American ships held back by American locomotives...

We are told that it is dishonorable, unfair, treacherous, etc., to permit American SHIPS to use an American CANAL, unless we also let English ships use the canal, without charge...

The railroads want no free use of the canal by American coastwise ships, and they fight such use through the politicians and newspapers that they own...

Now ships will go from New York to the Pacific Coast through the canal, and the cost of water freight will be very small—UNLESS THE RAILROADS CAN MANAGE TO FASTEN A TOLL ON AMERICAN FREIGHT USING AN AMERICAN CANAL...

For, don't you see, every dollar that railroad influence can lay as a tax on American shipping in the canal IS A DOLLAR THAT THE RAILROAD CAN ADD TO ITS FREIGHT CHARGES.

Let our Government charge American ships \$2 a ton for using the canal, and the railroads can at once add \$2 a ton to their freight rate.

Remember that when you hear the pitiful sobbing talk about protecting poor Great Britain against such an "outrage" as letting Americans, who built the canal and paid for it, give free use of it to American ships.

England, as a matter of fact, is very little interested in the matter, except that England's rich men own the Canadian Pacific Railroad, and they, like our railroad owners, are working to fasten a tax on American ships IN ORDER TO ADD THAT TAX TO AMERICAN FREIGHT SHIPPERS.

Fortunately the matter is pretty well understood. This country will let all American ships use the canal without charge very soon. And our coastwise shipping will be free at once.

The Congress in this instance will not be used as a railroad freight collector. One Senator the other day introduced a resolution to set aside the existing treaty with England entirely—a thing we have a right to do at any time. There is no doubt that whatever may be necessary will be done to make and keep the American Canal FREE TO AMERICAN SHIPS.

Even the railroads, after they lose their foolish fight, will find it a good thing FOR THEM to help the general American property.

Free use of the canal and low freight rates will bring lumber to the Atlantic Coast from the Far Northwest and bring fruit to the East from California and other Pacific States.

Eastern products will go at low freight rates through the canal to the Pacific. Business will grow, enterprise will find encouragement, labor, industry AND the railroads will share in the benefit of a canal UNITING THE COUNTRY MORE CLOSELY AND MORE CHEAPLY.

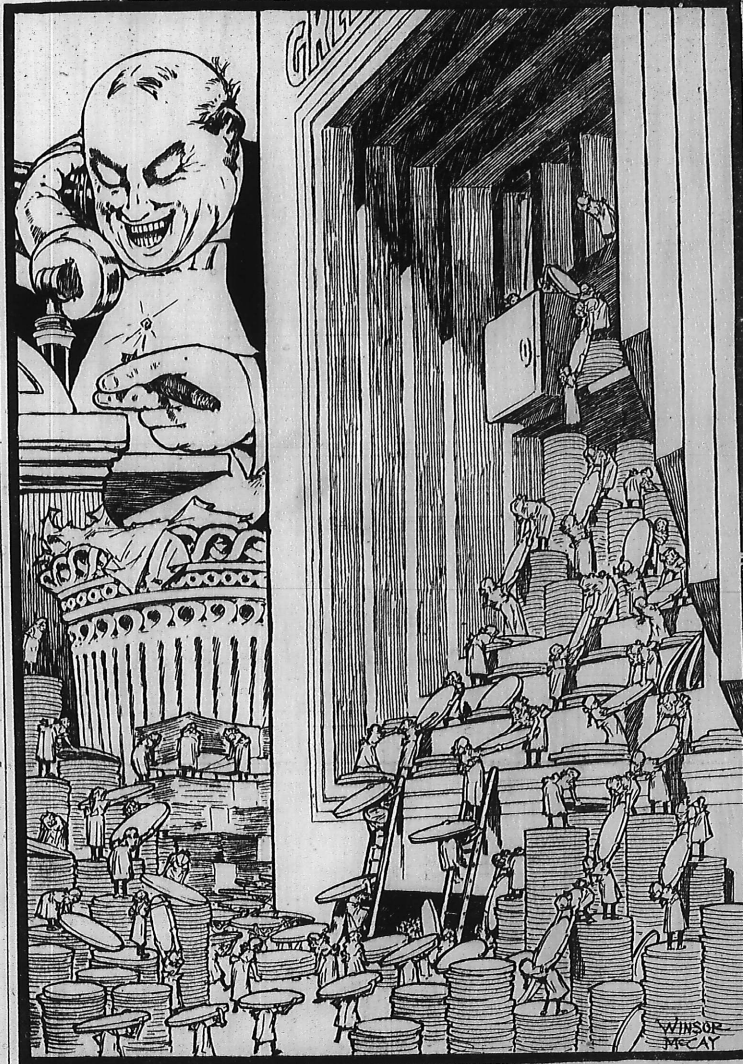
For every carload of cheap freight going through the canal and taken, apparently FOR THE railroads, there will be two extra carloads of high priced freight FOR the roads. Profitable long hauls will increase and profitable short hauls as well.

And within ten years intelligent railroad men will think the Panama Canal and free use of it by Americans for prosperity such as they have never seen.

NEW YORK, May 10.—Miss Ramona Borden, 17-year-old daughter of Gall Borden, multi-millionaire New York milk dealer, whose mysterious disappearance from a New Jersey sanitarium several weeks ago caused a big sensation, is today reported to be missing again.

Credence was given the report by announcement at the Vanderbilt Hotel, where Mrs. Borden and her daughter have been living, that both left the hotel and that their present whereabouts are unknown.

The first hint that Ramona had run away again came from New Haven, Conn., to which place she had gone with Mrs. Helen Sefton White, wife of a rich Cleveland, Ohio, chewing gum manufacturer, on her recent runaway escapade.

Reported in New Haven. A dispatch from New Haven reported that a woman answering Mrs. White's description met two young girls at the railway station there, the party going to a hotel where they registered as "Mrs. W. J. White and daughters, Niagara Falls, N. Y."

One of the girls answered the description of Miss Borden; the other resembled one of Mrs. White's nieces who was a member of the previous runaway party. When Mrs. White was approached in New Haven by reporters she denied that she was the same woman who connived in the Borden girl's escape from the sanitarium.

At the office of Mr. Borden it was said today by Mr. Borden's secretary that the girl's father had no knowledge of her being in New Haven.

Mr. and Mrs. Borden returned but did not divorce. Mrs. Borden makes her home in Los Angeles, Cal., by came here when she received news of her daughter's mysterious disappearance several weeks ago.

DORSEY HAS VALUABLE EVIDENCE IN PHAGAN CASE

Fulton Solicitor General Declares Facts Unearthed by Best Detective in Country More Direct Than Storer Girl's Testimony.

Former Factory Employee Asserts Frank's Office Was Empty at 12:05 Noon on Day of Tragedy, Contrary to Sup't's Story.

Evidence "exclusive and valuable" in the Mary Phagan case has been obtained, and is in the hands of Solicitor General Dorsey. So much the Solicitor said today, and no more, declaring details of the evidence would be revealed at the proper time.

The evidence is the result of work by private detectives engaged by the Solicitor, among them one whom he termed "the best detective in America," when speaking of him Friday.

The Solicitor today declined to make public the slightest hint as to the nature of the evidence, or as to the identity of the person toward whom it points.

He mentioned the important evidence when he discussed the statement by Monteen Storer, the 15-year-old employee of the National Enameling and Tinning Works, who testified that it is in direct contradiction to the testimony by Leo M. Frank, the suspected factory apprentice.

The Solicitor was interested in the girl's statement, but declared that the other evidence in his hands was far more important and valuable.

In opposition to the testimony of Leo M. Frank in the Mary Phagan case was the statement of the Storer girl. The evidence that she will bear in the effect that she was in Frank's office at 12:05 o'clock and a little later on the Saturday afternoon preceding the discovery of the dead girl's body, and that she found it deserted.

According to Frank's testimony, he was in his office from 11 o'clock until 12:15, when Lemmie Quinlan, his former name, in "Dixie" that time he said, Mary Phagan came in, about 11:05 o'clock to receive her pay.

Monteen Storer is certain that she reached Frank's office at exactly 11:05 o'clock. She has been retained as an important witness.

Remember the Time. "The minute I got to the office floor when I went up to get my pay," she said, "I looked at the clock. I wanted to know if it was time to draw my money. I would have looked at it, anyhow, I suppose, as it is always customary for me to look at the clock thing upon entering the place to go to work."

"It was five minutes after 12. I was sure Mr. Frank would be in his office, so I stopped in. He wasn't in the outer office, and I went into the inner office. He wasn't there, either, though he might have been somewhere around the building, so I waited."

The whole place was awfully quiet. It was scary. When he didn't show up in a few minutes, I went to the door and looked around the machinery. He wasn't there. I stayed until the clock hand was past one o'clock, and I saw no one. I went down to the street and saw no one. 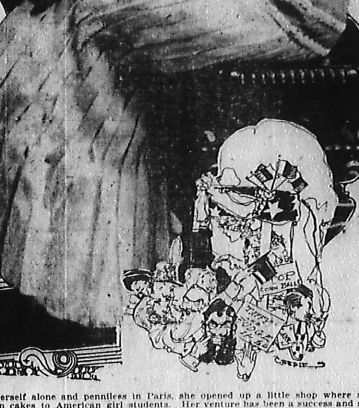

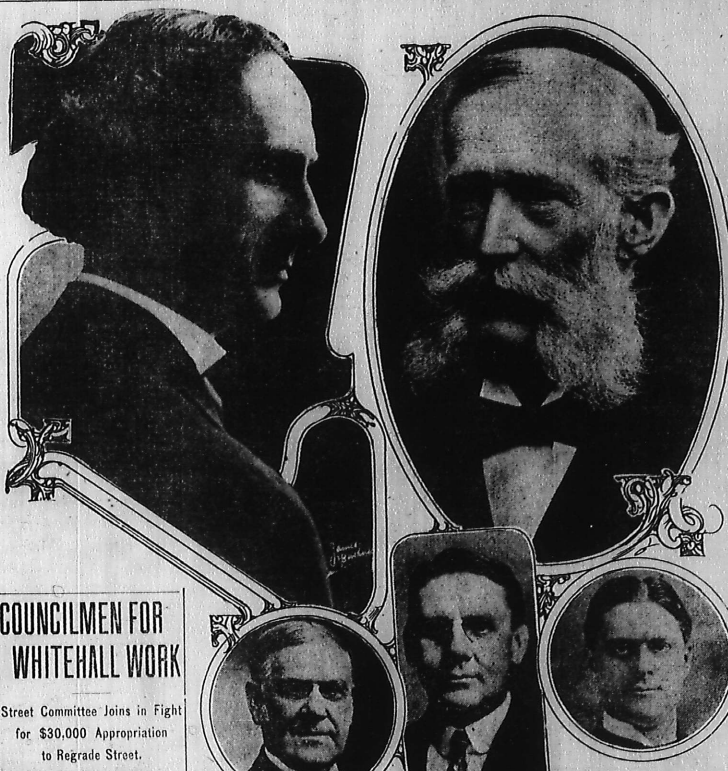
