The Deadly Pullman By Elbert Hubbard Hubbard

A RNOLD BENNETT has recently passed the Yankee Nation a few compliments by the right oblique. Giving us credit for what we are, he has also called attention to a few things that we are not. However, instead of starting a line of backtalk, if we pause a moment and take a second look at our British cousin's criticisms we will find them mostly founded on fact. "Bad air is the bane of the Pullman palace car," says Bennett. Honestly, now, isn't he right? The railroads lag behind in matters of sanitation. The rule is that railroads will not put in any improvement that is not anticipated by the people, and for which there is not a crying demand.

You do not have to look very far back to remember when the engine used to whistle for brakes, and the brakeman would leap from his seat to the front platform and swing himself on the wheel.

George Westinghouse's idea of the air brake was not accepted on sight. He had to make a fight for it; its use was demanded by the people; and then the railroads were forced by statute law to put it in.

It was the same with the vestibule and automatic couplers. The link and pin remained on passenger trains until their use became a misdemeanor before the law.

The same with the deadly stove, that heated the passenger car with its auto de fepotentialities.

Then we had Pintsch gas. Now most trains are lighted by electricity, and thanks to the cunning genius of the Jovians, the juice is generated by the turning wheels of the train, and at trifling expense.

When it comes to cleaning and ventilating coaches, the railroads are in the Dark Ages. The carpets, upholstering, curtains, beddings, even in your latest Pullman, are dens of dirt, disease, dissolution and death.

Here we are on our shelves, sometimes two in a berth. Consumptives going out West in the hope of getting well, and consumptives coming home to die, ride in Pullmans. Any one too sick to ride in a day-coach is put in a Pullman, even if a collection has to be taken up to buy him a ticket. A Pullman is, in one sense, a hospital car, and so should have a degree of attention in the line of sanitation that, perhaps, a day-coach does not.

Well does Arnold Bennett say that in a Pullman we are breathing the vilest air that can possibly be gotten together.

Forcing air into a car does not either ventilate or clean.

The new idea in sanitary cleaning, applied to new buildings that are up to date, is thoroughly familiar to every architect. The idea is to carry air out of a room instead of forcing it in. It is the reversal of the pneumatic tube or compressed air.

There seems to be a specific demand from the public for better air in the Pullman coaches, and fewer microbes. And Arnold Bennett merely expressed this general idea

that is in the minds of thousands of travelers. A whisk-broom, a dusting cloth, a feather duster, or a broom of any sort, belongs to pioneer times.

Most certainly, every Pullman car should be fitted up with a sanitary suction air cleaner.

Passengers could then be dusted with a convenient little hose device that takes the dust right out of the clothing and sends it shooting down and out the railroad track under the car.

And there are going to be laws against the use of the deadly whisk-broom and its progenitor, the broom, known as "woman's weapon." These things have got to go.

There is now a rule on the Pullman cars providing that the porter, every two hours, during the day shall go around with a dust cloth and wipe off the window-sills. In doing this, he simply removes the dirt from the window-sills to the passenger, or to some other part of the car.

With a suction hose he could ventilate and clean the car, just as easily as he now makes you move over so he can distribute some dust and dirt.

The Pullman car is a great disseminator of disease. Nothing equal to it exists in all civilization.

The lower berths of a Pullman contain a good deal more than their quota of carbonic acid gas. This poisonous air clings to the carpets, lies close to the floor and rides as far as that Pullman goes, be it from New York to Chicago, Chicago to San Francisco, or Joppa to Jerusalem.

He who rides in a Pullman car is not especially in danger of accident by derailment, head-on or tail-end collisions, but he always suffers from dirt, dust, bad air, and the germs of disease and death that lurk unseen.

Effete matter given off constantly by passengers in a place occupied by a score, which naturally, and in a state of decency, would be occupied by two, must be met by scientific plumbing.

Civilization is largely a matter of pipes and wires. And as we use pipes to bring us water, and wires to fetch us light, so must we use pipes to get rid of dust, dirt, and consequent disease.



A Song of Sixpence

Square, New York, Jim Borden was noted for many things, but quietness was not one of them.

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



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Why Aeroplanes Fall

THERE are three causes for aeroplane accidents, due to the three factors in the problem, the man, the air, and the machine. Aviation, therefore, cannot be considered as other than an experimental idea until these three conditions are overcome. An aeroplane must be made fool-proof (more or less), it must be made with a wide margin of safety against possible atmosphere conditions, and it must be possessed of a mechanical strength far greater than the utmost of the strain to which it may be subjected.

The first problem, that of the aviator, cannot be considered solved until the number of motions needed to guide and direct the machine are made so few that they can become habitual. A bicyclist is entirely unaware of the balancing of his body to cope with the deviation of his wheel from side to side, and even a chauffeur learns to direct his car with comparatively little mental exertion. But the aviator has so many things to do, so many delicate forms of bal-



Besides all which, little eddies and whirthpools are formed known as "pockets," in which the air is so thin that it offers practically no resistance to the wings of the aeroplane and it drops down suddenly. THE announcement of a confusion of memory in a plant brings up with startling distinctness the possession of memory by plants. The plant which has so surprised the scientific world was one on which experiments had been made for a period of many months, these experiments being designed to find out whether a plant would learn to respond to an artificial day and night, each six hours long. Under the stimulation the plant soon responded. The experiment was then tried, whether, on returning the plant to the ordinary course experiment was then tried, whether, on returning the plant to the ordinary course





A sensitive plant, accustomed by nature to respond to the normal 24 hour day, was taught to adapt itself to an artificial day of six hours of light and six hours of darkness. When the day was made 24 hours again, the plant became confused and sometimes expanded in the dark and drooped in the light

of day and night, it would revert to the old twelve-hour alternation. This it also did. But when, again, the plant was subjected to a constant illumination, the memory sense became confused and it would open and shut its leaves sometimes at six-hour inter-vals, some times at twelve-hour intervals, as though it remembered both its lessons but did not know which one it was expected to be doing.

This has been seized by the few remaining scientists who hold the so-called "lost cause," viz.: the doctrine that characteristics secured by education can be inherited, as a great argument in their favor. If, they argue, a plant can be shown to possess such memory as to be able to exert movements of two entirely different kinds without any especial outside stimulation, this must be regarded as pure memory. From this claims have been made that nearly all the features which are characteristic of human memory can be found in rudimentary form in the vegetable world.





Under the same chain of similarities is the Under the same chain of similarities is the power of the tendrils of a climbing plant to grope for and find a support which they may grasp, and the communication through the plant to its various tendrils when one of them has found firm hold. The quickness of such vegetable forms as sensitive plants, too, in realizing the approach of danger is felt to show a certain quickness of apprehension that seems to belong more to the animal than the plant world. 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

A T a time when the whole civilized world is endeavoring to find the best way to stamp out crime, and fearing to adopt the only true restrictive measure on the ground that it interferes with personal liberty, it is of importance to note what a great restraint lies in ceremony. Consider the simpler aspects of life. Kissing is a ceremony; there is no especial sense organ directly referable to sex that is excited by a kiss, and yet a close embrace suggests affection and love. If between husband and wife, in America, the exchange of kisses has ceased, in nearly all cases love has waned to a vanishing point. Yet kissing is unknown to ninety-five per cent. of the human race. Here, then, is a ceremony having no physical significance, of very restricted area, which is so closely attached to domestic life that its cessation becomes a grave factor in social conditions.

Men and boys are as susceptible to the influence of ceremony as women and girls. Tell a boy he is a boy and that he is to sit still on a stool, and nothing on earth short of force or fear will make him do it; but put some unusual-shaped cap on his head, give him an imitation gun, enlist him in a company, call him a soldier, and sit him on the same stool at the same door, calling him a sentinel, and he cannot be bribed to leave it.







part of it is true, of course; the steady tippler does ruin his health but the first part is most untrue. Many an attack of consumption can be traced back to a single "jolly evening." Most of those who remember the "night after" will recall that the voice is usually quite hoarse, and that without there being any soreness of the throat the talking tones sound harsh and unnatural. Those, moveover, who may chance to have been afflicted with a cold or cough, will remember that on the "morning after," this cough seemed to hurt the chest a great deal more than it did before. However, the feeling soon passes away, of course, and it is easily forgotten.

But the germs of consumption are everywhere, we breathe them in constantly and a culture of the air from a street car or a subway train will show them in thousands. In such forms they are easy to resist, the vitality of the body not permitting the unwel-come germs to make a landing, as it were. But when the vitality is as greatly lowered as is the case during the reaction from intoxication, the germs are in a position to get in their work, and they rarely lose an opportunity.

The lowering of vitality requires that the body work doubly hard to try and recover

The lowering of vitality requires that the body work doubly hard to try and recover that lost strength, and the lungs, accordingly, are driven to the utmost in the attempt to secure as much oxygen as possible from every breath of air. The lungs and the passages leading to them are less watchful of dangers. That little harsh cough which followed the "party" the next day, and which you seemed to throw off so easily, was probably never thrown off. As you returned to normal strength the other parts of the lungs took up the work of providing the blood with sufficient oxygen, and the tiny little patch on the lungs was a unnoticed. But rapidly or slowly, according to one's constitution and the way in which one lives, that patch upon the lungs may grow and grow, until a doctor is consulted and his first examination tells the story. Something fatal, even so insidious a thing as tuberculosis, must begin sometime, but far too many people lay themselves open for that beginning by a "spree." And it is especially wise to remember that in the proportion that a man is tired, a spree will do him harm, the more tired he is the more harm it will do.



Dirty Bottled Drinking Water

Dirty Bottled Drinking Water

NE of the most recent demands of civilization and one that is growing as fast as any is that of bottled drinking water.

A small proportion is consumed because of lithia and other medicinal properties but the great bulk is drunk on the theory that it is purer and cleaner than the liquid which comes out of the cold water faucet. Sometimes this assumption is true and sometimes it isn't.

If you want to know whether your bottled water came, originally, from a clean source, has been put into clean bottles and has been handled with decent care, pour out a glassful and hold it up to the light. Focus your eyes on it carefully for a minute and watch. If you see a myriad of tiny particles which look like the dust specks in a sun-beam, you may be sure the water is dirty and though it may not be dangerous it ought not to bring the price of pure bottled water. Makers of distilled waters often neglect to protect their tanks from dust and in consequence deliver a dirtier fluid than the water from which they made the distillation.


