By the adoption of the initiative, referendum and recall amendment to the city charter of the voters of Atlanta can recall Mayor James O. Woodward. Recorder Nath R. Bryce, Police Chief James L. Weaver, Fire Chief W. H. Cummins, School Superintendent Watson and any one of the twenty Councilmen or ten Aldermen, any Board member and any head of a city department, according to a ruling by City Attorney James L. Mayson Thursday.

Mayor James O. Woodward and his staff were delighted. The Mayor issued a formal statement on the result of the election Thursday in which he declared the vote indicated that the public disapproved of the policies of the majority party in Council. He stated three candidates who so before the people for re-election next Tuesday.

At the charter election held yesterday, three questions were submitted to the people. The first, the revised charter. The second, the power of the Recorder's Court. The third, the initiative, referendum and recall.

The Recorder's Court, it is provided that if a majority of the votes cast in favor of the principle of initiative, referendum and recall, then same shall become a law.

Under these provisions the result of yesterday's election, when declared as therein provided, is to limit the power of the Recorder's Court to a sentence not exceeding 90 days upon the public works and not exceeding \$200 fine.

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# WORLD SERIES OPEN FOR NEW YORK OCTOBER 7

## 50 ELIGIBLE TO PLAY TO PLAY GAMES

No Ground Rules, for Crowds Will Not Be Allowed to Swarm on the Field.

**PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 25.**—The first world's series game will be played in New York on October 7. This was decided by the National Commission to-day when they assumed that the Giants would win the National League pennant.

The umpires are Connally and Egan for the American; Klen and Rieger for the National League.

**50 Players Eligible.**  
The list of players eligible to play in the series as announced by the representatives of the two clubs and stamped with the approval of the commission follows:

**Many Seats Reserved.**  
The prices of seats for the series: New York—Box of four seats, \$25, 13 for upper grandstand reserved seats, 42 for lower grandstand seats not reserved; 41 for bleacher seats. One-fifth of the capacity of \$2.00 is reserved.

Philadelphia—Box seats, 15 each; reserved seats in main grandstand, 43 each; reserved seats in right and left side pavilions, 42; bleachers, 41. Two-thirds of the seating capacity reserved.

No photographers will be allowed on the field excepting those employed on the daily newspapers and they must be off the field before the game begins.

**To Be No Ground Rules.**  
There will be no ground rules. This is an innovation. This year no one will be allowed on the playing field except the players and every hit will go for what it is worth.

No tickets will be sold through the mails. All applications for tickets for the series must be made in person to the secretary of either club. The National Commission will have nothing whatsoever to do with the distribution of tickets. Each club will handle its own tickets and in its own way.

Seats not sold on personal application will be placed on sale by both clubs on Monday, October 6, at the office before the opening of the series in New York and two days before the opening here.

The games each day will begin at 2 o'clock. There will be a band concert in each city before game time on 11 o'clock.

The Waldorf will be the headquarters of the commission in New York and the Bellevue Stratford in Philadelphia.

Cummings, School Superintendent Slaton and any one of the twenty five members of the Board of Aldermen, any board member and any head of a city department, according to a ruling by City Attorney James L. Maxson Thursday.

The Mayor issued a formal statement on the result of the election Thursday in which he declared the vote indicated that the public disapproved of the police, the fire department, the school and the education board. He attacked three candidates who go before the people for re-election tomorrow—Transit Superintendent the "Gander," Sheriff John P. Smith, and Councilman Albert B. Thomas. He said that the other four charter reform opponents who are running all of them would be defeated.

He said the vote for the Council Charter Wednesday showed that the "ring" in Atlanta had been broken and that the people of Atlanta had decided to do something that "organization" had been so long doing.

### Mayor's Statement.

"The charter election, held on yesterday, three questions were submitted to the people:

"First, the revised charter; second, the power of the Recorder's Court; third, the initiative, referendum and recall.

"Under section 215 of the revised charter it is provided that the result of the election thereon shall not affect the several sections of the act which provide that the provisions shall become a law when approved by the Governor, nor the provisions of section 215, which submit to the people the question of the Recorder's Court power, and section 215b, which submit to the people the question of initiative, referendum and recall.

**Limits Recorder's Power.**  
"Under section 215-a, it is provided that if a majority of the votes cast is in favor of vesting in the Recorder's Court the power set out in the second part of the act, no part of the power of the Recorder's Court for a term of labor and imprisonment not exceeding 30 days or by a fine not exceeding \$500. This said provision shall become a law when approved by the Governor.

"Under section 215-b of the amended act it is provided that if a majority of the votes cast is in favor of the initiative, referendum and recall, then shall same become a law.

"Under these provisions, the result of the election shows that if a majority of the votes cast is in favor of the power of the Recorder's Court, the power of the Recorder's Court shall be limited to a term of labor and imprisonment not exceeding 30 days or by a fine not exceeding \$500.

# POLITICIANS STUNNED BY RECALL VICTORY

## Armed Clash Near in Tenn. Capitol

### NASHVILLE POLICE ON GUARD IN HOUSE

Mayor Leads Entire Force to Capitol as the Legislature Opens. Troops Are Demanded.

NASHVILLE, Sept. 25.—Following the riot in the House of the Tennessee General Assembly Wednesday afternoon, when Speaker Stanton arbitrarily adjourned the body out of fear of violence, with John Yeaman from the gallery and other fire marshals of the State having guns trained on the speaker's stand, it was feared today that there would be a clash when the two Houses met about noon. Every policeman in the Nashville force was sent to Capitol Hill before 11 o'clock to guard against violence in the House. Mayor Howe announced officially the charges of the policemen. He said if rioting broke out that the police could not handle it would call on the Governor for troops to prevent bloodshed. A killing was narrowly averted yesterday when Speaker Stanton arbitrarily adjourned the House under duress from the gallery. Legislators discussing measures for the enforcement of prohibition laws. His action nearly cost his own life. Guns Trained on Speaker. Several men trained their revolvers on the speaker's stand. He was escorted from the chamber and after the adjournment Representative A. L. Todd addressed the members of the House and the men in the gallery, stating that peace be maintained. Speaker Stanton to day resumed a position in which he explained his action in adjourning the House without waiting for a vote. He said: "I would have had told that members of the House were on the floor armed. The House was in the worst turmoil and disorder. In the gallery to my right there were partisans gesticulating in a threatening manner, while near them, with guns drawn, were John Yeaman and a man named Garrett. Clash on Floor Floored. "These two men were near culture, where they could pick me or anyone else off. Fearing that men's lives were in danger, I adjourned the House, as any proceeding officer would have done." There was much talk today of a fight on the floor of the House tooust Speaker Stanton. From the chair State Senator White led a protesting delegation of Democrats to the Governor's office with a protest against Mayor Howe's action in adjourning the body to prevent trouble and that city policemen be ordered to keep off the State property.

### Negro Shoots Man, Then Fires House

## OUT ATTORNEYS HOLDS ALL RECORDS CARRY, BUT CHARTER FALLS

Here is the result of the special election on the amended city charter for Atlanta, the initiative, referendum and recall, and the provision reducing the power of the Recorder to thirty-day sessions and \$200 fines:

For Charter ..... 1,487  
Against Charter ..... 2,194  
For initiative, referendum and recall ..... 1,922  
Against initiative, referendum and recall ..... 1,277  
For reducing power of Recorder ..... 1,841  
Against reducing power of Recorder ..... 1,883

It was made plain by City Attorney James L. Mayson Thursday that despite the defeat of the so-called new charter, the only radical reform submitted to the voters Wednesday, the initiative, referendum and recall clause, was adopted by a comfortable majority. These principles of government will be added to Atlanta's present charter when Council formally declares the result of the election the first Monday in October. By getting a petition of 25 per cent of the registered voters the people can call an election on the recall of the Mayor, any Councilman or Alderman, board member or head of department. Also the voters have been virtually given the power of legislation. They can kill ordinances. Politicians declare this is the most forward reform step taken by any municipality in Georgia in many years. It is an outgrowth of that part of the commission government plan which has been the target of most of the criticism against the system.

"Open-Town" Advocates Pleaded. Advocates of an "open town" polity on operations of the majority members of Council that the defeat of the new charter was an expression of public protest against commission government or any similar reform. They are interested in the reduction of the Recorder's power, making his fine limit \$50 instead of \$100 and his maximums stockade sentences 25 instead of 60 days, in a victory for them. The Recorder can not impose sentences of more than 30 days now, but Council, under the old law, had the right to increase the limit to 60 days. The result of the election is to make the limit arbitrary. This provision was adopted separately, according to City Attorney Mayson, just as the initiative, referendum and recall amendment was defeated. City Attorney Mayson's ruling his disallows that opinion. Here is the vote by wards:

### DEATHBLOW TO 'RING', MAYOR'S DOCUMENT ON RESULTS OF ELECTION

With the so-called citizens committee charter killed in the special election, the surprising development was announced Thursday that the initiative, referendum and recall have become a part of Atlanta's system of government by a comfortable majority.

In spite of published announcements to the contrary, this radical reform according to City Attorney James Mayson, is incorporated in the charter along with the provision curtailing the power of the recorder despite the defeat of the main provisions of the substitute charter.

In the opinion of many observers it is the most radical step forward in popular government Atlanta has taken in many years. It gives the people the power to initiate any laws they wish, to have any bad law referred to them, and to recall officials who have proved unworthy.

The action of the voters yesterday in adopting these measures that have become so popular in many of the western states marks the entrance of this reform into Georgia government.

Mayor Woodward declared that the defeat of the substitute charter was a death blow to "ring" rule in Atlanta politics.

He took his regular stand on the street at five o'clock in front of a clear store early Thursday and to many questioners who came up to congratulate him he announced he would issue a formal statement later in the day interpreting the significance of the election.

Means End of 'Ring', He Says. "It means the end of that little crowd of Councilmen who refused to allow the people to vote on genuine charter reform last spring," he said.

He said that the reform had been long in the making and that it was the result of the persistent efforts of the people.

He said that the reform would give the people a more direct voice in the government and that it was a step toward the realization of the principles of democracy.

New Democratic Laws Force Big Business to Consider Welfare of Employees.

By B. C. FORBES

American employers that kind of MEN, what kind of VOTERS, are you turning out?

This question is not often discussed by financial or business leaders, by chambers of commerce or boards of trade, by railroad or industrial or mercantile conventions.

Yet is it not as important even as tariff legislation, currency reform or any of the other serious problems now engaging business men's minds?

America is proud of her manufactures, proud of her agricultural achievements, proud of her great railroad systems. All these are vital to the country's well-being.

But a nation's greatest asset is her citizens. On her citizens depend everything else. They are at once the foundation and superstructure, the Alpha and Omega of her existence, her very raison d'etre.

Said one of our foremost bankers to me the other day: "Don't forget that there is to be a change in the method of electing our Senators."

"They are to be chosen by the people."

"They are already acting with this in mind."

"It means that the Senate will become less conservative, that it will be less of a bulwark than heretofore against radicalism."

"We must not overlook this fact in analyzing the financial and business future."

Had you thought of that?

Does it not mean that the people, the ordinary, everyday voters—are moving nearer the throttle of the engine of government, that they are breaking aside privileges, classes that they are pointing the "old guard" who have rendered long and arduous service on behalf of their masters?

Doesn't you learn to see, therefore, why it is of greater moment than at any previous time in America's history to consider the question just presented? What kind of voters are our corporations and other employers turning out?

Let us here leave out of account entirely the moral aspects of the subject and discuss it strictly as a business proposition.

The factory worker, the clerk, the invoice, the day laborer, the railroad man, the miner, the wagon driver, the stevedore, the printer, the mucker, the molder—all are voters. And we have just noted that the voters are leading into the saddle, that they are asserting their right to govern the country without the obstruction of old school politicians placed and kept in power by capitalistic interests. SIDELIGHTS on GEORGIA POLITICS by JAMES B. NEVIN

There will be held in Atlanta on November 26 a reunion of the Georgia Senate of 1888-89.

This splendid Senate was sworn in somewhere about the last of October, 1888, and many members of it still survive, notwithstanding the fact that a number of them have grown to be old men.

The reunion was proposed by former Senator T. E. Massengale, of Norwood, who has a son in the present General Assembly.

Mr. Henry Chastain, of Atlanta, who was Secretary of the Senate at the time this Senate sat, has the success of the proposed reunion very much at heart, and will leave nothing undone to make the meeting a pleasant and profitable one for his old associates.

In the days of this Senate, a very high-class lot of men came to the General Assemblies, particularly because the Judges and Solicitors were named by the Legislature then, and a fight for a United States Senatorship was confined almost exclusively within the capitol walls.

It is estimated that at least 20, and perhaps 25, members of the Senate of 1888-89 will be present in Atlanta in November when this reunion is called to order.

The question of Wheeler County's legal existence having been raised recently in Judge Park's court, in Hancock County, the Judge substantially decided the vexed question in favor of that new political district of the State.

The issues involved an attack upon the county on two grounds. The constitutionality of the adverse petition was that the election at which the incumbent created the county was adopted by the people was not such a general election as is provided for in the constitution, and that the constitution provides that there shall not be more than 14 counties in the State.

The principal arguments were made by Col. Warren Grier, in the attack on the new county, and Solicitor General William Woodson for the respondent to the writ.

At the conclusion of the hearing Judge Park immediately rendered his decision upholding the legality of Wheeler.

In response to an inquiry from the Comptroller General, the Attorney General has held that the act requiring all officials within this State, compensated in whole or in part by fees, to file with a designated authority a list of those fees from time to time, is a continuing and permanent act, and not an act applicable only to a specific period of time.

One section of the act questioned requires that these reports, as filed with the Comptroller, be returned to the State Legislature, and some officials have contended that that language limited the operation of the law to the two years then affected.

The Attorney General rules otherwise, however, and has informed the Comptroller that the law is intended to apply for all time, unless repealed by the Legislature at some future date.

This ruling sets definitely at rest considerable uncertainty as to the new law, and incidentally thence mightily the hopes of some county officials hoping to reap it.

## **Evelyn Thaw's Tribute to Her Mother**

"I have the fullest admiration for my mother's character. She is altogether a wonderful woman. She is one of those sweet characters who could not plant a dry stick in the earth but it would blossom; who can make the prettiest things; is eminently efficient in all her household duties; the most perfect and dainty of housewives; the most trusting and believing of creatures.

"But she did not understand me. To-day I am probably the greatest enigma that the world offers her. I am outside and beyond the range of her understanding. She is one of those women who are always willing to believe the best, and quite ready to fear the worst.

"I can not take a convenient and lazy course and put all the blame of the friction, which at various periods undoubtedly existed, upon my ancestry. My mother and I were temperamentally different. That is the way Chief Beavers Wednesday morning heartily expressed his first anniversary anticipation.

**As Chief Views Move.**

He declared that the year has passed clearly three things: That it is possible to close the temptation district.

That the houses of vice in Atlanta are closed for good.

"No matter whether I am chief of police, or who is chief, open and recognized vice never again will be tolerated in this city," was his confident assertion.

The chief said that immediately after he had closed the district he was assured by citizens that if he could keep it closed for one year he would do the city a wonderful good that could mean in no other way.

Various groups were advanced, he said, as to the length of time before the houses would come again—ranging from eight months, others four or five months, and some even one month.

"I have never had a doubt but that they were closed for all time, because I know the people of Atlanta want a clean city," said the chief.

He expressed himself as greatly pleased with the general results of the vice war. He said:

"I know that Atlanta has been benefited, and even though I should never do another thing for the city, I feel that my 24 years' service as a policeman and as chief of police has not been in vain. 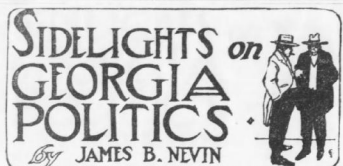

"We had hoped to clear the entire case in American Saturday and are quite disappointed," said Burton Smith, addressing the court. This habeas corpus proceeding for the possession of her child, Madeline, was postponed in order that the whole case might be handled in one court.

Mr. Smith, with Mr. Barlow, went before Judge Bell Thursday morning and asked that the habeas corpus be reinstated on the docket and he given an immediate hearing.

Mr. Barlow has made his arrangements to be here for a few days and it works a hardship to keep him changing between here and Savannah, said Mr. Smith.

"Under the demand of Mr. Moore that he be given ten days in which to prepare his reply, I will set the hearing for Saturday week or Monday week," said Judge Bell.

He instructed the attorneys to confer and see if they could not determine upon a date, but so far they have been unable to do so. Mr. Smith will make another effort to have the hearing before the end of the week.

Mrs. Barlow did not appear in court.

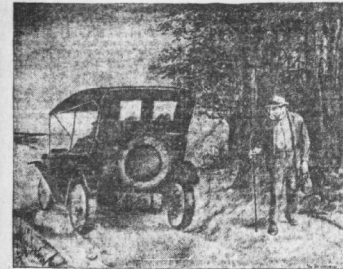
