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NEW FIGHT FOR McNAUGHTON PLANNED

SAVANNAH, Sept. 30.—That a new movement to secure the pardon of Dr. W. J. McNaughton, whose sentence of death was commuted to life imprisonment by Governor Slaton, Saturday, became known today.

His attorneys began right after the decision was announced to prepare evidence that had been found since the case went to the Governor. They are expected to make a new appeal to the Pardon Board. Just along what line, or when, they will not say.

"All we have to say is that we are not through with the case," said one, "and we abandoned hope of securing this man's freedom. We do not know exactly when, or how we will go about it, but we will not give up until every fight is lost."

Dr. McNaughton shows none of the disappointment he felt at the decision. He greeted his friends today with the same smile and warm handshake and said that he was ready at any time to begin his sentence at the State farm.

"It will not be necessary for them to send for me," he said to-day. "If they will send me transportation to the first train, I came into this place a gentleman and I will leave it that way. I have not abandoned hope. I believe, as I have always believed, that truth and justice will triumph in the end."

The Rev. Hugh Wallace Seeks "Slave-Driving" Evidence to Give Labor Unions.

The Rev. Hugh S. Wallace, pastor of the Jones Avenue Baptist Church, whose strategic denunciation of labor conditions in Atlanta aroused wide interest, Tuesday morning declared to The Georgian that his fight is to probe thoroughly into the personal life of the owners of factories, workshops and other places in which large numbers of girls are employed, to ascertain whether these men are moral, whether they are making any effort to safeguard the morals of the working girls and whether they are oppressing these girls by forcing them to slave long hours for a starvation wage. This feature of his investigation already is under way, said the Rev. Mr. Wallace.

Unions to Get Facts. The life histories will be turned over to the local Federation of Trades, he said, to be used in its fight for the betterment of labor conditions for women, girls and children. He outlined his plan in this way: "I am now gathering a list of the factory shop and store owners of this city to find out just what concerns

Seven Contests in All. There are 22 candidates in all, with seven contests. Nominations to-day mean elections in the general election in December. Voting for candidates without opposition is just a formality, but where there is opposition some of the bitterest contests Atlanta ever has seen are being waged.

Here is a resume of the issues in the seven contests—three Aldermanic races to be voted upon by the whole city and four councilmanic races to be voted upon only in the wards in which the candidates are to be elected.

Bitter personal attacks have been made by J. N. Beauford and Charles A. Alverson, opponents for Council in the First Ward. But there is a deeper significance in this fight. Mr. Beauford is backed by Mayor Woodford and Mr. Alverson has the vigorous support of Carlisle H. Mason, chairman of the Police Commission.

In the Third Ward the fight is between Alderman James E. Warren and Councilman Charles W. Thomson. Both are planning for reelection, and C. W. Thomson has a bitter personal contest with Mr. Braxton and Mayor Woodford for their affiliations.

There is a pretty tight fight between R. E. George and A. J. Wainwright for Council from the Fourth Ward. In the Fifth Ward, Jesse B. Lee and Dick D. M. Elliott are running for the vacant councilmanic seat. Mr. Lee's friends claim that he is a better candidate than the other two.

The only clear-cut "open town" race is a pretty tight fight between D. Thomson and Amos Braxton for Alderman from the Fourth Ward. Mr. Braxton's platform is a "liberal" one. He has a bitter personal contest with Mr. Thomson for their affiliations.

Broker Tells Court How Governor Lost in Gambling on Big Four Railroad Shares.

These striking points were out at the close of the day's evidence.

Specialist Three Years. That Governor Sulzer had for years been Wall Street active, with Harris & Fuller, was made. That in that time the net amount amounted to a total of \$12,428.71.

That it was closed July 12, 1912, with a net loss of \$5,414.71. That the day before he was inaugurated the firm transferred an account from an open one to a firm loan by a trick of book-keeping.

That the Governor never got a cent as a loan when the transfer was made. Wife Not in Deal, He Says. That the Governor told his wife after he was called to testify, "You know this is Mrs. Sulzer's account."

That Fuller declined to know any such thing and swore that he never heard of Mrs. Sulzer in the firm's transactions.
