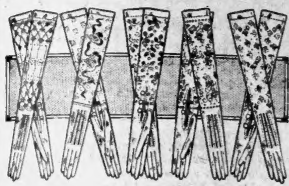

DO NOT SINGLE SHOT;**IT KILLS YOUR VOTE**

Candidates and Executive Committee Call Attention to Rule for County Primary

At the request of a number of candidates to the forthcoming county primary The Journal herewith prints the resolution against single shooting adopted by the Fulton county Democratic executive committee last Friday. The resolution follows:

The attention of candidates and voters participating in the Fulton county primary on May 8 is expressly directed to the rule, which will be rigidly enforced, prohibiting single shooting in votes for offices where more than one vacancy is to be filled, and single shot votes for such offices shall not be counted.

RECEIVER IS ASKED FOR AMERICAN LOAN COMPANY

A. J. Baskin and J. J. Thomason, Holders of "Loan Contracts," Allege Insolvency

Alleging that the defendant "has failed and refused to comply with the conditions of the contract, but, on the contrary, has misappropriated and misapplied great amounts which properly would have gone to the reserve and loan fund," Albert J. Baskin and J. J. Thomason, as plaintiffs, filed Thursday afternoon in the superior court a petition asking that a receiver be appointed to preserve the assets of the American Investment & Loan company, and that the company and its officers be enjoined from disposing of any assets.

Judge George L. Bell set May 2 as the day on which the defendant company shall appear in court and show why this petition should not be granted. The two plaintiffs state in their petition that they bring this suit in behalf of themselves and of other contract holders similarly situated.

They charge "upon information and belief, that the defendant is still using for its purposes in violation of the terms of the contract with the petitioners, substantially \$15,000, which should be used only for making loans to the contract holders and for other purposes named in the contract."

They also charge that "your petitioners show that the defendant is in fact insolvent and unable to pay its obligations," and ask that the court take steps to preserve for the plaintiffs' money due them before the defendant company can dispose of its assets.

The plaintiffs, it seems, are holders of one or more "investment contracts" or "loan contracts," attached to the petition, Baskin states. He says the defendant company \$270 in monthly installments and also an advance sum of \$4. Thomason states he paid \$15 in installments and an advance of \$4.

These plaintiffs, on their own behalf and for others similarly situated, ask the court to order the company to repay to every "loan-contract" holder the sum he invested, and ask that an accounting be made to determine the value and disposition of all money received by the defendant company to the credit of the loan and reserve fund. It is this loan fund that the defendants are accused of misappropriating and misapplying. It is not known how many "loan-contract" holders there are, but their number is said to be large.

Winkles & Latimer and Albert H. Mafer, attorneys, filed the suit.

CAPTAIN W. M. MAYO IS INDORSED FOR SHERIFF

Candidate's Friends Hold Enthusiastic Meeting on Bellwood Avenue

At an enthusiastic meeting Thursday night of the friends of Captain W. M. Mayo, who is running for sheriff of Fulton county, the captain was heartily endorsed by his supporters.

The meeting, which was held at 197 Bellwood avenue, was the third which has been held since Captain Mayo began his campaign. George G. Gentry, a member of the police board, presided and addresses were delivered by Roy Dorsey, J. W. Whitaker, Irvin McPherson and Colonel G. H. Cornwall.

Captain Mayo placed his record as a member of the police force before the meeting as a proof of his fitness for the office of sheriff, and his record was warmly praised by the audience. Roy Dorsey attacked the conditions which he alleged exist in the Fulton county jail under the present administration and said the officials now in the sheriff's office deserve to be ousted.

The Benton Incident.

From an international standpoint, one of the most
recent incidents in the Mexican revolution was the
killing of William S. Benton, a British subject. It
was rumored at the time that he met death directly
at the hands of General Villa, a leader of the Con-
stitutionalist forces. The circumstances of the case
were peculiarly suspicious, and were at once recog-
nized both by the State department at Washington
and by the office of foreign affairs in England as de-
manding scrupulous investigation.

Jingoes immediately seized the occasion as a pre-
text for renewing their cries of intervention. They
predicted grave issues between the United States
and foreign governments, particularly Great Britain,
that had interests in Mexico. The more irrespon-
sible of the war-wavers went even so far as to
suggest that England would send troops into Mexico
and that thus the Monroe doctrine would be chal-
lenged. They could see no possible adjustment that
would not greatly embarrass the Administration.

But the British authorities were admirably self-
restrained, while our own Department of State re-
sisted the vision of insisting that the affair be thoroughly
probed and that responsibility for Benton's death be
fixed and met. General Carranza, chief of the Con-
stitutionalist movement, acceded to this request. A
commission was appointed to investigate the affair,
and so far as can be judged from outward circum-
stances, its work has been dutifully done. It re-
ports that Benton was killed by a lieutenant of Villa,
outside Villa's camp and without his warrant. The
offending officer has been found guilty and has been
sentenced to execution.

Thus, it would seem, the Benton incident is prac-
tically closed. Another "crisis" in the Mexican
situation has blown over. The Jingoes are again
disappointed, the cry of "foreign complications"
again silenced.

Atlanta's Grand Opera, A Southern Institution.

There is no longer a doubt that this season will

ever before assembled for a series of operas in any
city of this country or Europe. It seemed almost
incredible that the patronage could pass that high
mark; but there is now every indication that it will.

The demand for season tickets was extraordinary.
The demand for single-performance tickets, which
were put on sale this week, has been no less wide-
spread and continuous. Music lovers in every part
of the South are making reservations. The out-of-
town attendance will be far larger than ever before,
and the local patronage will be unprecedented.
Only the unusual capacity of the Auditorium, where
practically every seat is a desirable one, could ac-
commodate such audiences.

The phenomenal success of Metropolitan grand
opera in Atlanta is due in part to the relatively low
prices of admission, and these in turn are made pos-
sible by the great number of people who attend each
performance. The entire South, moreover, appre-
ciates the opportunity of hearing the world's rarest
interpreters of music. Atlanta's grand opera week
has become, indeed, a Southern institution.

The Ad Men and the Plaza.

With its accustomed loyalty to every movement
for Atlanta's upbuilding, the Ad Men's Club has cordi-
ally endorsed the Blockley plaza plan and has
pledged its aid to a campaign, for a bond issue of
two million dollars to carry that great enterprise
to completion. The attitude of this organization is
typical of the community. The people as a whole
are suffering from the gorge of smoke that now
poisons the city's heart; the people as a whole will
profit if this unsightly nuisance is replaced by an
avenue of civic beauty and usefulness. The plaza
plan will accomplish that end. It will relieve At-
lanta of its heaviest discomfort and drawback, will
open a new era of prosperity and growth, and all
this, it will do without imposing a dollar's addi-
tional burden on the rank and file of taxpayers.
Public spirited men are naturally in favor of such a
project.

Mr. Harrison Blockley, the gifted architect who
originated the plaza idea some six years ago, gave
an interesting account, in his address to the Ad Men
Thursday, of what other American cities have
done, or are preparing to do, along similar lines of
improvement. Cleveland, Ohio, has recently spent
sixteen million dollars on a plaza plan. Chicago
is now considering a kindred project that will cost
two hundred and fifty millions, and St. Louis ex-
pects to invest three and a half millions for a like
purpose. The improvement proposed for Atlanta
will cost only two million dollars, but its returns
in quickened growth, increased prestige and public
benefits will be incalculable.

Atlanta has earned its place among the distinctive
cities of this nation through the energy and
faith and workmanlike patriotism of its people. They
have gone forward from year to year with a gener-
ous thought for the common good; they have planned
and worked in unison, and never yet have failed to
support a movement for their city's welfare. The
plaza plan is the greatest enterprise ever presented
them. They will not fail to carry it into effect.

Using Government Lands.

From the Department of the Interior, comes the
interesting information that fifteen thousand acres
for special uses of the Government's forest
lands are now in force, ranging all the way from
apiaries and cranberry marshes to fox ranches and
whaling stations. Permits are limited, of course, to
responsible persons and to industries that will in
no way conflict with the Government's plan of con-
serving natural resources. The forest reservations
are opened to individual enterprises without being
exposed to damage or serious encroachment.

This simple incident uplives the more liberal
and practical policy of conservation the Government
is now pursuing. Time was when the main idea of
conservationists was to place all public lands under
a federal lock and key and hold them there. That
point of view was largely justified by the fact that
special interests were seeking to gain a monopoly
of such resources; it was essential first of all to
check these raids and to protect the common rights.
But that phase of conservation has served its purpose.
The great need of the present is to utilize
and develop the vast field of natural treasure which
the Government controls, to safeguard it still against
monopolistic invasion, but at the same time to
open the way, as far as feasible, for honest enter-
prise.

That is the distinctive purpose of the Alaskan
railroad bill. Some years ago Congress was urged
to save Alaska from the Guggenheim syndicate, and
the appeal was certainly warranted. But it was
not enough for the Government to take the merely
negative attitude of prevention against trusts. It
was necessary to go further and make Alaska a land
of free opportunity for the people. Its wonderful re-
sources should not be hoarded but used. The con-
struction of the Government railroad will make such
use possible.

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THE FEDERAL CITY

BY FRANKLIN P. ADAMS.

VI.—ITS ORIGINAL INHABITANTS.

The inhabitants of the city of Washington, from
the years preceding the removal of the seat of gov-
ernment from Philadelphia to the Potomac, were the
original proprietors of the land; workmen and
merchants, and a small group of men of
some distinction who had been members of the
new establishment and moved on the ground to
assist in the work as officials or as voluntary
workers.

Of the original owners, the name of David Ben-
jamin is remembered, largely through the tradition of his
dispute with Washington and the commissioning of
the city, but chiefly because of the romantic interest
of the story of his daughter, Maria Ben-
jamin, who was married to John P. Van Ness, mayor of the city, and be-
came a leader of society in later days.

The original proprietors were divided into two
classes, one owning land near Georgetown or water-
end, and the other owning land at the eastern end
of the city. Of the Georgetown faction Robert Peter was
the principal member. He was a merchant, and was en-
gaged in business, and was the leading financier of the
city. He owned practically all of the extensive and
important portion of the city of Washington. A son
of his country place of Mount Pleasant and the remain-
ing part of the city, now developed into a densely
populated section.

The leader of the faction at the eastern end of the
city was Daniel Carroll, of Duddington. From a
general use of identical Christian names in Maryland
Carroll was distinguished and his name was necessary.
Daniel Carroll, of Carrollton, who was a signer of
the Declaration of Independence, so that it was neces-
sary to give him the style of Charles Carroll, of
Duddington Manor, to differentiate him from the
other Carroll. The name of Daniel Carroll was ap-

pointed first superintendent of the city.

Of the group of newcomers the man whose name
is chiefly connected with the Federal City, Dr. William
Thornburn. He was a native of the city, and was
settled there to practice. He was apparently in-
terested in architecture and philosophy, and was the
principal member of the Georgetown faction. He was
building in Philadelphia and was a prominent figure
in the philosophical discussions in that city during
the latter part of the eighteenth century. He was ap-
pointed a member of the second board of commis-
sioners of the city of Washington, and in 1802 was ap-

Major Andrew Elliott, to whom reference has
been made in the plan of the city, was the son of
the name and the grandson of one of the best

What Anne Rittenhouse Says

PARIS.—The high collar rules all others. One rarely sees that shape known as the Medici which was brought out two summers ago by M. Paquin and which gained in favor throughout the year.

But the elimination of this one shape does not mean that the idea of a high collar has been abandoned. To the contrary one sees nothing else on the smartly dressed women. The expensive gowns have them attached, the high with shoulders, and the shape are filled with separate ones in varied fabrics and of many prices.

Before I left New York two or three shapes there had the high, simple collar starched linen or muslin, and the neck attached was terrifying to the woman with a limited income. One shop on Fifth Avenue asked six dollars and a half for such a collar of this material with a hem-stitched finish, and a black cravat.

The same collar with cravat, was sold for seventy cents here in February. America was evidently charging for the idea, and probably by this time the shape has been so widely copied that its price has been divided by five.

Starched White Collar.

There is nothing to this collar but its shape, and that is good. It does not require boning; it must gain its uprightness through starch. This fact makes it expensive, but not more so than any other kind of collar. Like Brummell's neck-tie it must be constantly fresh and there must be many of it.

The ordinary shape is called *Riton* over here, and the same suits it quite well, for it closely resembles the rolling piece of linen that these dapper English school boys wear at their necks. It has no ornamentation except the thread of hem-stitching. Its points run down on the front of a blouse which has a V-shaped opening, and the cravat or cravat black ribbon is run under it in order to hold it up.

This shape stands up and rolls well down, and it is not so content, under a coat. It is not high enough to reach above the collar of the jacket, and it becomes easily crumpled beneath.

It is the collar of the season, however, for blouses attached to skirts, as well as separate white wash waists. Remember that its glory lies in manner of its rolling. It does not lie flatly the blouse, nor does it stand erect against the hair; it rolls up, then outward, then downward, not clinging closely to the neck, but making a frame for it.

High Waistcoat Collar.
The smart touch on the street over here, is loose waistcoat or *haute* white homespun linen or pique which is fastened in a straight line up the front and ends in a high straight collar that would reach the back of the head if the hem did not roll a bit and stand well out from the head. There are two outstaring points at each side of this collar which are not always becoming on separate collars, but no women should scorn this shape without carefully experimenting with it before the glass. It is not for every face. The French women are able to wear far more fantastic things on the head and neck because of the slenderness of face and smallness of feature. The Americans with their larger faces must be careful.

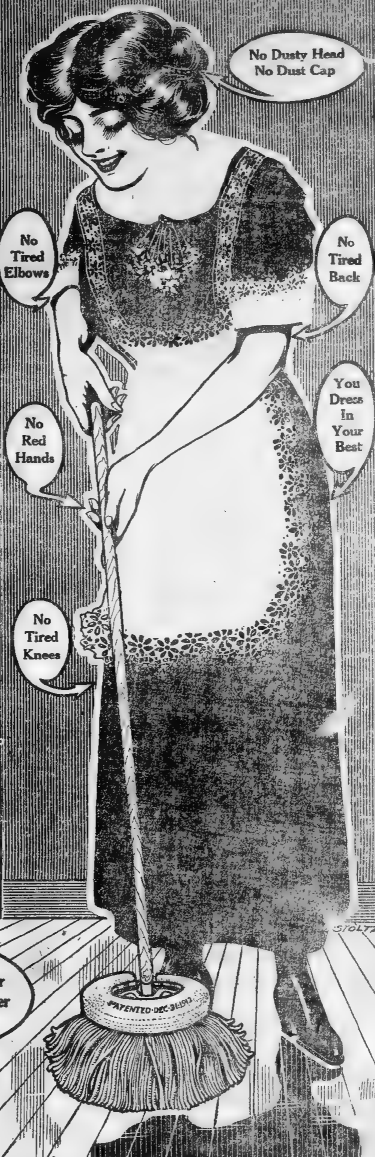

President Hedges Plans Defense Against Further Raids

Browns Seek to Prevent Other Federal Raids

Following Loss of Pitcher Earl Hamilton, President Hedges Removes Ten-Day Release Clause From Players' Contracts—Hamilton Received \$5,000 Bonus

ST. LOUIS, Mo., April 10.—After the loss of Earl Hamilton to the Federal league yesterday, and the announcement of Clem Clements that he would go to Chicago today, where, it is said, he too, will join the new league, the local American league club today began building arrangements to protect itself from further onslaught by the Federalists.

The first and strongest defense the Browns' president has thrown about his players, it became known today, was the elimination of the ten-day release clause from all 1914 contracts. This clause had given the club right to drop any player upon ten days' notice. The Federal league in the attempt to lure Hamilton, it is said, will argue the lack of continuity in the ten-day release clause.

Next to that measure, which is one of the strongest arguments by which the St. Louis manager, Mr. Hamilton, has been lured to the Federal league, is the removal of the ten-day release clause from all 1914 contracts.

Branch Hickley, manager of the St. Louis American league, has had several interviews with the players who were said to have visited St. Louis during his stay here and he announced he did not believe any members of his team would go to the Federal league.

A \$5,000 bonus and three-year contract for a total of \$17,500 was the bait that caused Hamilton to jump from the local American league team to the Kansas City Federalists, according to Clarence Walker, Hamilton's roommate, who was present when the deal was closed this morning.

Walker explained as follows: "McKall walked in here before breakfast, laid \$4,000 on the table and said: 'I'll give you this \$4,000 and a three-year contract for \$12,000. Will you join?'"

"Hamilton answered: 'Make it \$5,000 in advance and I'll sign the contract now.'"

An argument ensued which culminated in Walker extracting another \$1,000 from a bag he was carrying and putting it on top of the four bills already on the table.

"Now will you sign?"

"Well," said Walker, "when Hamilton saw these five \$1,000 bills and the \$5,000 which he had secured, he would sign money whenever he played a game with the Kansas City Federalists he started receiving this etc."

NORFOLK, Va., April 10.—Decision of the officials of the Jamestown Jockey club to abandon the spring race meeting in order to avoid any conflict with the Virginia authorities over alleged violations of the anti-betting laws, caused keen disappointment today among lovers of horse racing.

He has the hardest material to handle—and the poorest. He hasn't as much good baseball flesh as St. Louis. And he has a machine that through many seasons has become accustomed to slipshod, careless, unambitious play.

CHANCE FOR A MIRACLE.
We have seen where the Reds were picked to finish anywhere from third to fifth. If Hertzog can lead them this season beyond seventh place he can prove that the day of miracles is not yet passed. For to beat out even one club with his present machine will be an achievement worthy of pennant-winning fame.

The Reds have been a doomed machine for three decades. They have never won a pennant. Cincinnati is a fine baseball citadel, deserving a better fate, and many of the game's greatest heroes have worn the crimson hoistery of the Rhinecland clan. But time has brought no improvement. Agents' best improvement until Red directors give some man a good, fair shot at the job.

HERZOG A HELP.
Hertzog should be the right man for this undertaking. He is hard working and up-to-date. He is brainy and a hustler. He is the type that looks to one goal and never quits. He is clean all the way through, ambitious and on the level.

His ball club will be a help for him—or get the boot. But he can't win without the stuff. He has a fair infield and a fair outfield, but his pitching staff has been hacked to pieces and his catching department is far below par. This material is shy both on offense and defense—and if it mounts above seventh place it will be simply because Canteloupe Charles has achieved the miraculous and has shown ability to wear a machine beyond its natural speed.

DETROIT CHIT-CHAT.
We have been tipped off from several reliable sources that Hughie Jennings has improved his Tigers immensely and will put a far better club in the field than he has shown since the Tigers made that memorable spit back to 1911.

The tip comes that Ty Cobb is working harder than ever before—that Sam Crawford is in better shape—and that Hughie at last has compiled a pitching staff worth while.

In Cobb and Crawford, Jennings has one of the greatest combinations in the game to lead and attack. These two run neck and neck with Collins and Baker, Lajoie and Jackson, Speaker and Lewis. Cobb is far and away the greatest ball player that ever lived at getting on and getting around. There is no one else close. And Crawford is almost as dangerous as Baker at driving a teammate home, for even Baker cannot hit one farther away from the center of the plate.

UP TO THE PITCHING.
If Jennings gets the pitching power he looks for, the Tigers may slip into terms again with the Naps, and Sox and Red Sox. If Hughie can ever get a ball club under good headway he is one of the greatest of them all in the art of keeping them moving on. Jennings had to start rebuilding in 1911. He has had three years now to complete the job and it is about time that he was showing his ball club's teeth again. He has to find a new pitching staff and a new infield, barring one man, and the answer now will be up to the pitching staff he puts in the field.
