









## HIGHER RATE IS ASKED FOR PULLING 7 MILEAGE

A. B. & A.'s Petition Will Be  
Heard by Railroad Commis-  
sion on May 24

The Atlanta, Birmingham and Atlantic railroad has filed a petition with the state railroad commission in which it asks that it be allowed to pull mileage on a basis higher than the 3-cent a mile.

The Atlanta, Birmingham and Atlantic is in class of the commission's authorized passenger tariffs, and all roads in this class are allowed 3 cents a mile on straight passenger fares. This road is asking that it be allowed to pull mileage on a basis of its standard tariff less 20 per cent, which means that the rate would be in excess of 2 1/2

Prior to the commission's order requiring mileage to be pulled on trains the Atlanta, Birmingham and Atlantic

in common with the other roads, pulled mileage Z mileage on its face value of 2 cents a mile.

After the courts had sustained the commission's order the roads withdrew

Under this agreement it was understood that the various railroads were to restore Z and other forms of mileage to the same status which they occupied before the original order of the commission.

Some days ago complaint reached the commission that the Atlanta, Birmingham and Atlantic road was pulling mileage on a basis of 2 1-2 cents

The road complied with this order but filed its application for authority

to increase the rate. A hearing on the petition will be held before the commission on May 28.

HOTEL MEN ARE READY  
FOR SHRINERS' COMINGAll of Them Wear Hunted  
Look, but They Are Not  
Stampeded

Already there is a hunted look in the eyes of every hotel manager in Atlanta. Ahead of them, flaring the mirage of some 2,000 Shrine guests who will avalanche upon them between now and Monday, divided in lots of hundreds between every hotel in the city.

But they are ready. Despite the fact that every room in every hotel in the city will be occupied and then some, the hotel managers announced Friday that arrangements had been made so that their guests would not be inconvenienced in the least.

Systems of baggage checking have been arranged by several of the hotels so that all the Shriners' baggage will be taken care of for them without their waiting and all the guests have to do will be to call at the desk and get the key to their rooms.

At the Ansley, announces Manager Letson, there will be 300 Shriners, first and second class, and two camps, at the Piedmont, reservations have been made for about 600; the Georgian Terrace, where no complete parties will stay, will house 250 Shriners and their wives and families; the Winwood and Aragon, where they will care for about 600; the Kimball house is prepared for 600; the Metcalf will have several hundred; and the smaller hotels will be crowded to the edge.

At Maxatlan there were no reports of additional rebel aggression today. The three main constitutionalist armies were preparing for the next blow in the campaign while Carranza moved to take the government from Chihuahua to Tlaxcala.

Rumors of the fighting at Maxatlan crystallized into a report that the rebels had fallen into the rebels' hands. Constitutionalists at Juarez, however, did not credit it.

The rebel campaign against Saltillo, Coahuila and other west coast cities was to be hurried, according to reports from constitutionalist camps in the west today.

Officials today sought additional information of the reported killing of two Englishmen and an American subject in Guadaluara. The fate of Austin Connel Sullivan, reported to have been arrested near San Luis Potosi, also caused uneasiness.

Urgent representations were made by the state department today through the Brazilian embassy to the Mexican government seeking the release of Vice Consul John R. Sullivan, who is reported held by the Mexican federalists at Saltillo. Consul Sullivan was reported taken by the Huertista forces while on a trip to San Luis Potosi and all efforts of the state department to locate him so far have been futile. The Sullivan incident added to the general feeling of apprehension about the state department.

Dr. Edward Ryan, who was condemned to death at Zacatecas and later released, is reported to have arrived today without mishap at Puerto Mexico together with 600 other refugees from the capital. They will go direct to New Orleans on board the Esperanza.

## U. S. MARINE CORPS

*By Frederic J. Haskin*

"The marines have landed and have the situation well in hand." This has been the burden of countless press dispatches from all quarters of the world.

and disaster has brought the average citizen to regard the United States marine as a mighty efficient fellow. In fact, he has formed the habit upon reading the first part of the sentence, "the marines have landed," to add the last part as a matter of course.

• • •

Wherever this country has had need of faithful service and resolute hearts, there the marines have been on hand. Not only in the van at this, they

second occupation of Vera Cruz, the American marines have been foremost for more than a hundred years. They have been the backbone of the nation's interests. They are the skimmiest line of troops the authority, the first on the spot, the first to land, and the first to engage in actual fighting.

Further than the fact that they generally carry out their tasks beyond all grounds for argument, there is little definite in the popular idea of the marine. The nature of their service, their organization and administration are not matters of general information. To most people they are men with belted trousers and a peculiar throb for trouble.

• • •

Marines are soldiers trained for service both on land and on ships of war. They are organized, drilled and equipped much the same as the

Absolute mobility is the ideal of their service. The khaki-clad marine is ready upon an instant's notice

to start for rebellion in China or followers of Huerta in Mexico City. There is never any confusion about a mobilization of marines. They are being mobilized continuously, one place or another, to sit on the lid where trouble is brewing. This is one of their specialties.

\* \* \*

When the occasion arises it is just a matter of an order and a few hours until the needed marines are on their way. They are old hands at it.

camp-making and camp-breaking, skirmishes, battles and emergency calls to the world's end. Not a year passes but they are called upon for this expeditionary work. They are familiar with life in the tropics and the rigors of northern encampments.

• • •

The headquarters of the corps is in Washington, from whence the major general commandant and his staff direct the work of the organization. The

marines themselves are scattered over the world in cruising battleships, in foreign stations, at various stations throughout this country, at navy yards, prisons, magazines, and with receiving ships. There are at present about 9,872 enlisted men in the corps and 342 officers.

\* \* \*

In the past one of the chief duties of the marine corps has been expeditionary work, or response to

emergency calls for the protection of the interests of the United States or the lives of its citizens in the troubled areas of the world. In the performance of this duty they have landed many times in the countries of South and Central America and of the Orient during periods of turmoil. Since 1900 thirty-eight expeditions of American marines have been sent out, the objective points of which stretch from Mexico to Abyssinia and China.

Other duties of the corps have been to provide detachments of from a dozen men under a sergeant to sixty or more under one or two commissioned officers for service afloat in capital ships; guard duty at naval stations, prisons, magazines, and yards; service with receiving ships and in our foreign possessions, and guard duty at such centers of temporary insecurity as Peking and Managua. A detachment of 225 officers and men of the corps protects the American

The duty of the corps, which has now come to be regarded as the most important, is that of advanced base work. This means the seizure and maintenance of ports for an advanced base of fleet operations in times of war. Such was the nature of the recent work of the marines at Vera Cruz, and such their occupation of Guantanamo, Cuba, in 1898. In the

Two regiments of about 1,250 men are to be organized and trained for this special purpose. One of these regiments is to be stationed on the Atlantic coast, probably at Philadelphia, while a similar regiment will be stationed on the Pacific coast at Mare Island.

Especial care is taken in the selection of recruits and officers for the marine corps. Applicants for enlistment have to undergo strict examination as to their physical, mental and moral fitness. The officers are appointed from the naval academy, from the ranks and from civil life. After enlistment, the men are

Marines are excellent shots. This probably explains in large part the effectiveness of their expeditions. Nearly 4,000 members of the corps are ranked as expert marksmen, and their rifle teams make dangerous competitors. Their team won two firsts at the Seagrass meet last year, while a member of the corps

won the Soviet championship match. A team chosen from among the marines on duty at the United States legation at Peking took first and third place last year, and again last April, in competition with teams from the legation guards of Italy, Austria, Russia, Germany, Great Britain, France and Holland. Moreover, the marines took first, third, fourth, fifth, seventh and eighth places in the open championship for North China May, 1912. This match was won for the third

The marine, or the battleship's soldier, was first employed among modern nations by Great Britain for the purpose of quelling insurrections among the militia sailors whom she pressed into her service. The employment of infantry on ships of war, however, was probably almost coincident with the fighting ship. In this country the marine corps claims to have longer traditions than the army, and the navy.

The marines took conspicuous parts in the brilliant acts of John Paul Jones. The first battle won by

marines was in February, 1777, when 200 of them, under the command of Major Samuel Nichols, carried by storm the English forts on the island of New Providence, in the Bahamas. It was the marines who, during the war with Tripoli, formed the body guard of General Eaton, American consul at Tunis, on his remarkable march from Alexandria to Derna, 600 miles across the desert. Upon their arrival at Derna the marines stormed the native fortifications, and for the

First time in our history raised the Stars and Stripes on a fortress of the Old World. "Tripoli" has since been inscribed upon their banner. The marines fought by land and sea through the war of 1812. Between 1816 and 1826 they fought the Spanish pirates in the West Indies, and in Sumatra were called upon to quell internal riots, and to police New York following the great fire of 1835. In 1828, when the Florida war broke out, they joined in the campaigns against the
