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## BECKER'S CASE NOW IN HANDS OF JURY FOR SECOND TIME

Takes Supreme Court Jurist  
Three Hours to Deliver His  
Charge in the Rosenthal  
Murder Case

WIFE OF DEFENDANT

[NEW YORK, May 22.—] The case of Charles Becker on trial for the second time for instigating the murder of Herman Rosenthal, was given into the hands of the jury this afternoon. Supreme Court Justice Sutherland took nearly three hours in delivering his charge.

Becker appeared in court a few minutes after the jurors were seated. His wife sat at the side of the room. "This defendant," began Justice Sutherland, "is charged with murder in the first degree. The people do not claim he fired the shot that killed Rosenthal, but they claim he instigated the crime."

"If this defendant as a lieutenant of police, or as a detective, procured or induced, procured or induced the murder of Herman Rosenthal to be killed," continued the jurist, "he is guilty of murder in the first degree."

The trial was brought to a close last night so far as the defense was concerned. A quick verdict is expected, many believe, at the first trial. The verdict was not reached at the first trial.

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## SALOON KEEPER IS KILLED BY A DEPUTY MARSHAL

James L. George Fires Bullet Into Head of Thomas H. English in the Latter's Saloon

After a hand-to-hand fight with Deputy Marshal James L. George, at 4:15 o'clock Thursday evening, Thomas H. English, proprietor of a saloon at 450 Marietta street, was shot and instantly killed by the marshal.

According to witnesses, English, who lived at 13 Greenham street, related the officer and drew a gun on him. The marshal fired first, his bullet penetrating English's temple, reaching the brain.

Chief Marshal W. T. Buchanan and Esquille L. L. Johnson and David P. Moran, all of the municipal court were with George, himself a deputy of that court. They all had come to levy under a \$4 fee for \$15.

George, it is said, attempted to take the cash register when English resisted him. After grappling with each other, George and English rolled along the bar, when English, witnesses state, reached for a gun lying behind the bar, where English is said to have tried to get hold of another revolver lying behind the bar. As he reached for this, George fired and killed him.

A different version of the shooting is told by George Manas, 124 Mangum street, and by W. R. Clower, 30 West North avenue, who claim to be eye witnesses of the affair.

According to Manas' story, the four marshals walked into the saloon and all of them talked to English. After this conversation, said Manas, English went to the cash register and began taking out the money. Then, Manas stated, Deputy Marshal George snatched from the other marshals, and walked to the outside of the city late last night. According to Manas, George turned toward him and fired. English, who was facing the cash register at the time, English did not reach for two pistols which were lying near the register. Manas said, but fell dead upon the floor.

W. R. Clower, who works in the bar, substantiated this story in every particular. He did not see the other witnesses.

Friends of Deputy Marshal George, however, question the story of Manas and Clower and the other alleged witnesses. Many of these friends, lawyers and others who have known George his official capacity for years, said that George was the kind of man who would never fire at another except in the most possible method of protecting his own life.

Accompanied by the three other marshals, George was taken at once to police headquarters by Patrolmen Holm and Bailey. Here George surrendered to Night Chief Jett.

George was then taken to the Tower, where bond was assessed at \$1,000. He made this bond, and was released.

The body of the dead man was taken to Harry Puck's mortuary. English, who was 41 years old, is survived by one son, Maurice, his father, T. L. English, and three brothers, all living eight miles out in Fulton county. They came to Atlanta at once to see about the funeral arrangements. They say the funeral will probably take place Saturday at Collins Street.

Six Valuable Paintings Destroyed by Militants in Galleries of London

LONDON, May 22.—The "wild women" of the Women's Social and Political Union, the militant suffragette organization, today continued their terrorizing tactics by making two separate attacks on the National Art treasures.

The turmoil of the battle in the vicinity of Buckingham palace, where a column of determined women yesterday attempted to reach the king with a petition, barely had subsided when early today a woman, armed with a loaded cane, rushed five masterpieces in the National gallery.

### Little Nell Brantley Carries Three Children to Safety on Her Back and Then Rushes Back to Get Dog and Dolls

A little ten-year-old girl, Nell Brantley, with blue eyes and brown hair, was the heroine extraordinary of a \$8,000 fire that totally destroyed the home of her mother, Mrs. A. Brantley, at 162 Forrest avenue, Thursday afternoon.

It was the little girl who discovered smoke and flames pouring up the back staircase. It was she who rushed out and warned her mother and sister in time to carry to safety a sick woman in an upstairs room. It was she who carried her two little nephews and her little niece on her back and under her arms down the stairs to the street. It was she who rushed back to rescue her pet dog from under the bed, and again, to carry out her beloved dolls.

In fact, Little Nell Brantley saved just about everything that was saved, the only thing she didn't save were two pet canary birds that perched in the lattice.

She stood beside her mother in the front yard of the ruined home Friday morning. A few articles of charred furniture on the ruined porch was all that was left of the household.

With tears streaming down her face, Mrs. Brantley declared that the fire had left her penniless. "I am only a poor woman," she sobbed. "And I've worked hard for twenty years to make a home. And now look at this!"

She swept her hand toward the blackened walls.

According to Mrs. Brantley, the fire may have been of incendiary origin. She says that her little grandson saw a man sitting on the steps of the fire alarm station, and about 3 o'clock in the afternoon, the man came to have told the little boy that he intended to blow up the apartment house.

She says she saw the negro man, matches and some bottles in his hand. They were working on this theory. The only description given of the black man was that he was a dandy.

The fire started shortly after 3 o'clock from a broken gas meter in the rear room on the bottom floor. Mrs. Brantley's daughter, Mrs. L. Sullivan, was in bed recovering from an operation. She was being attended at the time by her sister, Miss Minnie Lee Brantley.

Mrs. Brantley's another daughter, Mrs. Emma Harkins, were downstairs in the front room. In the room next the sick room upstairs were Nell and the three little Sullivan children, Boyd, aged five, L. L., aged four, and Gladys, aged two.

Nell says she smelled smoke and gas, so she left the children and hurried downstairs and back to the kitchen. Long tongues of flame were licking their way up between cracks in the floor and the walls.

The little girl rushed into the front room shouting fire. Mrs. Brantley hurried back to the kitchen and seized a bucket with which she tried vainly to stay the flames.

Mrs. Emma Harkins ran upstairs to the sick room, quieting the ill woman as she told her that there was nothing to fear, despite the fact that the fire was gaining headway every minute.

Little Nell kept her head better than anybody. She ran upstairs to the three little Sullivan children, bundled the smallest on her back, put one under each arm and staggered downstairs and out in the front yard.

Here she met her brother, Emmett Sullivan, aged six. Emmett and another boy, Fred, rushed into the house and upstairs.

In the meantime, Mrs. Brantley had been torn away from the kitchen and with her daughter, Minnie Lee, was standing in the front yard raising her hands and crying hysterically.

The Williams boy, with young Brantley and Mrs. Harkins, picked up Mrs. Sullivan in heavy blankets and started for the front door.

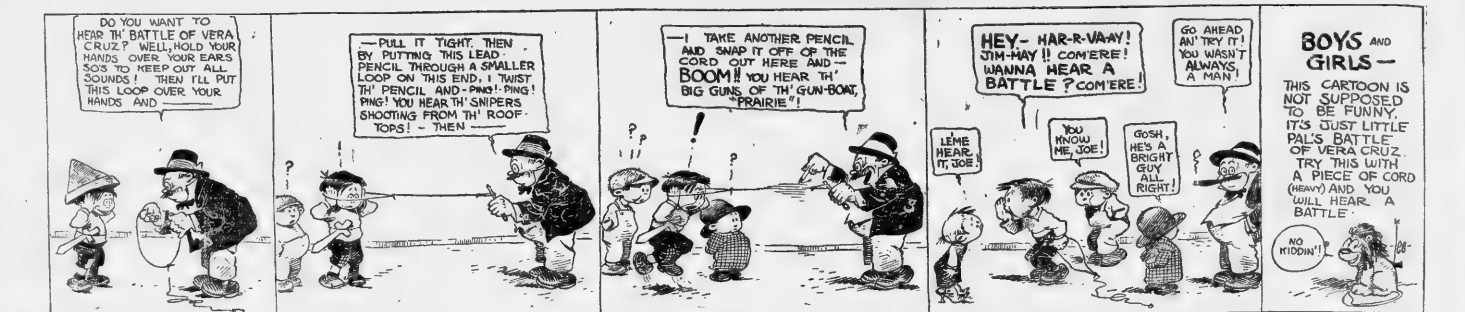

## THE SPORTLIGHT BY GRANTLAND RICE

We trust that those, if any, who played our tip in regard to forecasting a winner in sport will kindly remember us in their wills. Our tip—if you'll recall it—was to take any game and dope the situation out by the law of logical procedure and expected form—and then shoot your cash the other way. About eight times out of ten you'll be the one to step up and collect.

**AS FOR INSTANCE—OUR EXAMPLE.**  
The Glants have beaten the tar out of Pittsburgh, who in turn have put Kinkaid to the sword. The dope says pick the Glants to beat the Reds to death. And at the end of the second game the Reds had not only won both, but had compiled a matter of fifteen runs.

The Yanks piddle the stuffing out of the Red Sox and buckle before the Tigers. And the Tigers get their turn from the Red Sox. All of which is old stuff—but it still carries.

**THE LUCKY UPSHIRT.**  
For what he has done so far, Buck Herzog deserves more credit than as leader in baseball. Mirafraes are few and further between, but he has certainly not the nerve in Redding as far as he has gone. We don't recall that any manager in the history of the game has accomplished as much—with as little to work on from the start—both in the way of material and tradition.

**THE TRAVERS UPSET.**  
To the above unsets add the Travers upset in England. Here we had another pipe punctured at both ends and in the middle.

Travers' defeat was almost as much of a sensation as Outin's victory last fall. Both, as things happened, were beyond the bound confines of the eternal day.

A day or so ago we were discussing the intricacies of golf with Walter J. Travis. He had a part of the answer to Travis' case in advance. "In this game," he said, "no man can tell from his game of one day how he will be the next. No man can ever hope to master his score. The reason is simple. Golf is three games combined into one. The drive is an entirely different stroke from iron play, and putting is absolutely separate from both and totally unlike either.

"On this account," continued the veteran, "it is impossible to tell when the slip up is coming. No man can tell when all three will be working together, for no man can tell when his concentration will be good or when his mental and physical beings will be working in perfect coordination. It is largely for this reason that golf is the most interesting game ever devised for the player—and always will be. For it carries a mystery that holds and never lets go."

**TRAVERS AND TRAVIS**  
When Travis won at Sandwich in 1904 he had been playing poorly for two weeks before the first match. He was far off his game and only started coming back the day of the tournament's beginning. When Travers followed him ten years later he had been playing brilliantly for a month—travelling up the edge of the first battle. One entered just coming on to his game. The other just slipping back. The greatest feeling of confidence in the world comes from entering any tournament or any contest in the knowledge that after a slump is fast riding back again and is coming forward. The only way to beat this reminder is to use an axe or a pick. But he starts slipping backward he will generally lose himself if only let alone.

Travers hit his game a week or two ago, just as Hilton did in 1912, when he lost the British title. Evans and Outin caught on just in time to get under way fast.

**ANOTHER UPSET**  
Golf has its upsets, but so has baseball. Take these Pirates. They fear the heart out of the league for a month, beating all hands with abandon and a brave show of elation. Then, just as they are being picked to make a snuff of world series bids, they drop a matter of six games out of seven starts and founder around like a startled founder yanked from his home in the nursing surf.

Evilate it? Fine chance. It merely happens, and while a number of excellent theories are always in order the correct answer is beyond any human ken about as time goes up to eight. You can tell what they are doing, but not why it should be so.

**ANOTHER CROP**  
A portion of the old crop of ball players is wearing out, to judge by the showing of so many youngsters this spring. Here we have the Yanks and Browns with a bunch of youngsters playing about as consistently as any other ball club in their league, and yet two years ago no one ever heard the names of twenty persons on the two combined teams. Despite all snuffing, both clubs look to be strong enough to make a battle of it with any contender, for a stretch if not for a season.

There is also a new managerial trend on hand. Branch Rickey and Buck Herzog are members of it, but so are many others. They are the old system of rough-riding a club. They are undoubtedly the managerial sensations of the year, having made good with material that a carload of veteran managers in the past had scrambled up.

### "WEY CATCHERS ARE FEW."
