AGNES SCOTT PAGEANT TO BE PRESENTED TODAY

Alumnae and Students Participate in Celebration at College This Afternoon

The pageant given by the alumnae and students of Agnes Scott college, a part of the celebration of the commencement and quarto-centennial celebration will begin Monday afternoon at 4:30 on the campus at Decatur.

The pageant will be one of the most beautiful ever seen on the campus of a southern college, and the wide interest which has been taken in the commencement plans makes it certain that the audience will be a large one. The general public is cordially invited.

In the pageant, the history and the romance of education will be presented. It will be divided into three divisions: the past, the present and the future.

The past, which will be the first division presented, will be given by alumnae of the college. It will be presented in the form of a pageant, and the alumnae from the Bethesda orphanage, founded by John Wesley, the present day colleges, each school will be represented by students in the costumes of the time when the schools were founded.

The present will be an allegorical representation of a college education in the liberal sciences in modern times. Each department of study offered at Agnes Scott will be represented by figures significant of the romance of that department.

DANCES AND TABLEAUX.

A number of pantomimes and tableaux illustrating the different sciences presented by the students in the costumes seen in the first procession of the pageant, will follow the pageant proper. Beautiful dances and tableaux will present the poetical and beautiful side of the sciences.

Perhaps the most notable of these will be that of the department of biology, which will represent the birth of a violet.

The commencement exercises of the college began Sunday morning when Dr. C. W. Daniel, pastor of the First Baptist church, delivered the baccalaureate sermon in the Decatur Presbyterian church.

A procession of the graduating class preceded the sermon.

The actual quarto-centennial celebration will begin Tuesday morning at 10:30 o'clock on the campus. It will start with a procession in which noted visiting educators and the faculty will take part. Dr. Luke Johnson will open the exercises with prayer and a salutatory address will be delivered by Dr. J. H. Gaines, president of the college.

Other speakers Tuesday morning will be C. Murphy Chandler, chairman of the state railroad commission; Chancellor David C. Barrow, of the University of Georgia; F. W. Martin, vice president of the Georgia-Macon Woman's college; Miss Mary Keller, of Goucher college; Mrs. L. L. Scott, president of the Agnes Scott Alumni association; Chancellor John H. Kirkland, of Vanderbilt university; P. P. Claxton, United States commissioner of education.

Following closing the students will go to the Atlanta theater to hear Vice President Thomas H. Marshall's address.

Wednesday morning the graduating class will be presented with diplomas in the college chapel. Vice President Marshall and Senator Locke Smith will speak.

To that end he was a devotee of the abolition of the house of lords, the abolition of the electoral colleges and the removal of the vexing Irish question from British politics to the great of home rule. It is a tremendous programme, wider in scope and deeper in significance than was ever attempted by any of his progressive predecessors.

That success is apparently within his grasp is *quite* doubtful, as they all say, to luck. But a great part of it is due to Asquith.

It seems likely the finance committee of general council, when it meets the June appropriation sheet, will be asked to take back the January appropriation of \$15,000 to upgrade South Pryor street, which has not yet been repaved, and take back various other suspended appropriations, to "make ends meet" financially.

In preparing the January appropriation, said the finance committee estimated that the city's revenue from ad valorem taxes for 1914 would increase \$15,000 over 1913, which estimate was conservative as compared to the rate at which the tax revenue has been increasing for the past several years.

It develops, however, that the assessment on real estate fixed by the tax assessors are not sufficient in excess of this estimate to produce this additional revenue.

Consequently the finance committee, instead of having a margin over the anticipated \$15,000 for use in the June and as it usually the case, will find itself compelled to shave down every appropriation where shaving is possible, and furthermore to take back certain appropriations in order to "make ends meet."

The committee will meet at 9 o'clock Tuesday morning to commence work on the June sheet.

MAN SENTENCED TO HANG GIVEN MONTH'S RESPITE

Jim Cantrell, Who Was Convicted as Accessory in Murder Case, Gets Stay of Execution

A month's respite has been granted by Governor Slaton to Jim Cantrell, who was under sentence to be hanged on Friday, May 29, in the jail at Gainesville for being an accessory to the murder of Arthur Hawkins.

In allowing this respite the governor stated that he was moved to do so in order that this execution might be set for the same date as that of his brother, Earl, who is under sentence to be hanged for the same crime.

Being the principal in the Hawkins murder, and in order that the applications of both, for executive clemency may be heard by the state prison commission at the same time during the first week in June.

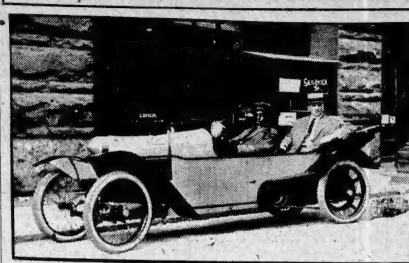
Mrs. Arthur Hawkins, wife of the murdered man, is serving a life sentence at the state farm near Milledgeville, having been convicted as an accessory to the slaying of her husband. It was contended by the state that Mrs. Hawkins and Jim Cantrell, who were indicted with one another, planned the murder and that it was committed by Earl. Her younger brother, Earl, who is the Cantrells boys have lost out in their appeals to the state supreme court.

District Attorney Whitman is said to be working on features of the case growing out of the testimony of several witnesses who, it was intimated today, may be prosecuted for perjury.

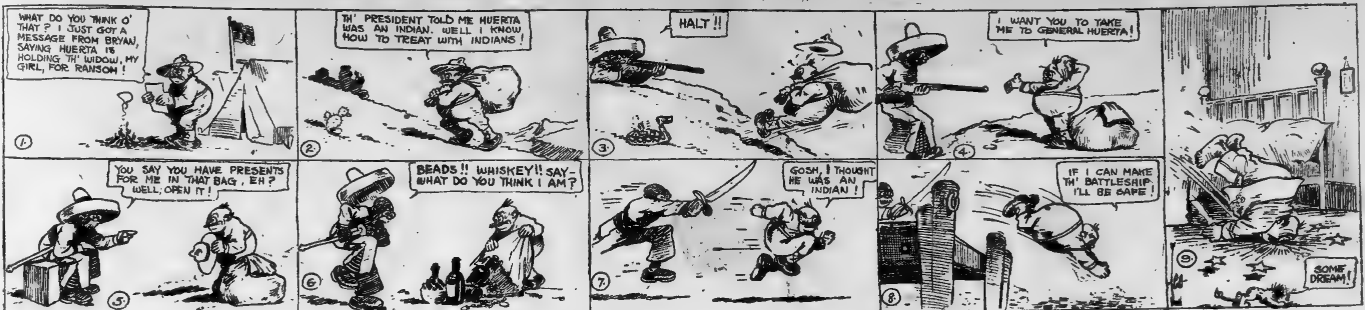
