Parkhurst to criticize anonymously the manuscripts submitted through the president, and offer suggestions for their marketing. The committee will not know whose offering they are considering at any time, for each manuscript will be numbered by the president and the author's name will be withheld.

"I find a tremendous interest awakening to the purposes of the club," said Mr. Parkhurst Tuesday. "Inquiries and suggestions are coming by mail and telephone from many people who are writers now or wish to be in the future. I believe the club has a great and useful future."

Mr. Parkhurst was elected president at the latest meeting, when Colonel John T. Graves was elected to the honorary presidency. The other officers of the club are Miss Alma Doody, first vice president; Angus Peterson, second vice president; Milton McGovern, treasurer; Miss Katharine Wood, secretary. The program committee consists of T. H. Miller, M. L. Leitch, D. B. White and Miss Nan Stephens. The meetings are held in the Carnegie library on the first and third Mondays of each month.

GEORGIA TO BE SEEN IN MOVIES AT EXPOSITION

National Film Co. to Show Resources of State at Panama-Pacific Fair

Through an arrangement perfected Monday afternoon by the Georgia commission of the Panama-Pacific exposition with the National Film company, of Washington, the resources and industries of the state will be practically shown in motion pictures at the big San Francisco exposition next year.

Ten thousand feet or more of motion picture illustrating Georgia will be taken and these will be exhibited free of charge in the Georgia building at the exposition.

The cotton industry from the planting of the seed to the shipping of the manufactured goods will be shown, as will the phases of the naval stores business from the logging of the virgin pine trees through to the shipping of turpentine and turpentine. The same comprehensive pictures of granite and marble industries, farm life, good roads, schools and colleges, banks, skyscrapers, water power, and hundreds of other industries and views will be shown in the motion pictures.

Members of the Georgia commission for the exposition who were present at the meeting Monday afternoon were: Dr. W. P. McCallie, state geologist; R. C. Neely, Waynesboro; H. S. Williamson, Forsyth; J. M. Vandiver, home; S. C. Dunlap, Gainesville; H. M. Stanley, state commissioner of labor; and Frank Veldin, chairman, who presided.

Speaking of the plans of the commission Chairman Veldin said: "The commission is planning to not only illustrate the state in motion pictures, but we hope to make a very strong display of the actual resources and products of Georgia. The members of the commission are deeply interested and they report that there is a strong sentiment all over the state in favor of the exhibit at San Francisco."

DORSEY MAY POSTPONE FRANK MOTION HEARING

Therefore the further postponement is indicated. The grand jury is not expected to resume consideration of perjury and bribery charges growing out of the extraordinary motion hearing, until the motion to set aside has been disposed of.

WOMEN ON CITY BOARDS

ARE O. K.'D BY COUNCIL

City Fathers Pass Charter Amendment to Legislature With Request for Enactment

The general council Monday afternoon passed up to the legislature with a request for enactment a charter amendment providing for women on the city board of health, board of education, city board and library board.

The amendment was introduced some weeks ago at the request of the Federation of Women's clubs, and a delegation of women appeared before the committee to which the amendment was referred and submitted their arguments. The committee unanimously recommended to council the passage of the amendment. Council vote was 14 for and 5 against, as follows:

For: The amendment was introduced by Wright, Kelly, Thompson, Alverton, Knight, Shepherd, Hall, Ashley, Partridge, Boynton, Wood, Colcord, Smith and Mason.

Against: The amendment was introduced by McDonald, McDaniel, Nutting, Armstrong, McCord, Lee, Dallas and White.

The two wards of the city are to be grouped in five groups, consisting of two wards each, and each group to be represented on each of the above-named boards. The present membership of these boards is twelve, and the women will increase the membership to seventeen. This arrangement is entirely satisfactory to the women who advocated the amendment. They did not ask for equal representation with men on the boards, but did they ask for membership on all the boards. The amendment, if enacted by the legislature, will be in effect January 1, 1915.

OFFICE OF CONSTRUCTION

Another important charter amendment passed up by council Monday afternoon was one taking the election of the city of construction out of the hands of the people and putting it in council. The council and the committee on public works were elected by council and a few years ago, when the two offices were merged into an office known as chief of construction, and this office was placed before the people. There was considerable opposition to putting the election back in council's hands and the vote was close, being eleven for and ten against.

An amendment recommended by the charter amendment committee, bringing back in council's hands the election of various municipal officers of the city, now elected by the people, such as the city attorney, city clerk, city engineer, city collector, manager of waterworks, city electrician, city building inspector, city warden, etc., was laid on the table.

Charter amendments occupied practically the entire time of the session, which was an admission of the special purpose of considering charter amendments.

Others passed up to the legislature in addition to those above mentioned were as follows:

Amendment authorizing council, on petition of a majority of property owners, to assess abutting property for the removal of a wall or fence.

Amendment authorizing council to establish building lines on streets.

Amendment authorizing council to regulate the smoke of plants within limits of the city limits in all directions.

FIXING OF SALARIES

Amendment authorizing council to fix the salaries of officials and employees, who are elected for specific terms, previous to their election, which will repeal the present charter requirement that such salaries must be raised within the year previous to election.

Amendment authorizing council to elect the chairman of a department board when the board fails to elect within sixty days after the date fixed for election.

Amendment authorizing the creation of the office of consulting engineer.

Amendment authorizing council, on petition of a majority of property owners, to assess abutting property for the cost of filling pavement.

Amendment authorizing council to remove sidewalks without first giving notice to property owners.

Amendment authorizing council to regulate the location, operation, etc., of fertilizer factories within two miles of the city limits in all directions, and authorizing the city to enforce all of its police and sanitary laws in this area.

Later, Call Officer Jones killed an other dog on Glenwood avenue that had been bitten by the mad dog.

Fifteen Georgia Counties Join in Monster Parade at Animal Industry Meeting

Quittman Is Host to Thousands at Greatest Convention in History of Section—Every Known Farm Product on Display

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)

QUITTMAN, Ga., May 26.—Mid-afternoon a madly of bells and whistles, the annual industry convention under auspices of the Georgia chamber of commerce was inaugurated today here today before 10,000 people. The parade, which was one of the most wonderful ever seen in Georgia, was more than three miles long, representing every known farm product. By actual count fifteen counties of the state stand there were 1,200 floats in the parade, four bands, eight hundred horses and mules with great herds of live stock. Some of the floats carried every article of product known in the south Georgia section and were wonderful to behold.

A monster dinner was served at noon in the city park and it is estimated more than 12,000 persons were on the scene of tables. A hundred automobiles came from Moultrie, a similar number from Valdosta, while all south Georgia towns were represented by long lines of cars carrying 100 numbers from ten to fifty people.

ADDRESS MADE

The address of welcome was delivered at 11 o'clock by L. W. Branch, of Quittman. Charles J. Haden, of Atlanta, president of the Georgia chamber of commerce, was the principal speaker of the day while many government experts, government motion picture men and others spoke at overflow meetings throughout the city.

Farm demonstrations are being held for the visitors and the government and state taking an active interest in the day.

More than fifteen counties of this section of the state are represented as the official program and the parade without question it is the greatest day in the history of south Georgia.

The Brooke county farmers are to be given full credit for this feature. They planned the floats, built and decorated them and the local committee in charge of the convention did not know what was coming from the county until this morning. The farm cattle, which were chiefly of cured bacon and the force crops which produce bacon, floats built of the famous Brooke county hams with the name of the farms lettered in mounts were greeted with applause.

FLOAT OF BACON

MANY CITIZENS TO HOLD INDIGNATION MEETING

Residents of Two Wards to Gather in Effort to Get Sewer Closed on Butler Street

Following an indignant protest Saturday morning before the public works committee of the county commissioners by citizens of the Fourth and eighth wards against the delay in closing up the Butler street sewer where it crosses the foot of North Jackson street, a great mass meeting of citizens of these wards has been called for 8 o'clock Tuesday night at the North Avenue school.

At this meeting, called by John T. Thompson, secretary of the Fourth and eighth Ward Improvement club, many residents will speak against what they term is almost criminal delay on the part of the commissioners in closing up the sewer.

The filth that pours out into the open 200 yards across the foot of North Jackson street north of Ponce de Leon avenue is enough, in this warm weather, to spread disease among the many blocks around," said Nathan Wolfe and Chas. Lagomastro, two of the leaders in the agitation Tuesday morning.

Besides the unhealthfulness of this open sewer in the heart of the residential district, the smell from it makes many homes absolutely unbearable. This smell is of such magnitude that it is not confined to homes near the sewer. It is carried for a surprising distance, especially about east on warm summer evenings.

There have a just grievance against the county commissioners for not covering the sewer, and we intend to press our demands until the commissioners act—and act quickly. For five years this sewer has been open, but shortly before January 1, 1914, the commissioners promised us that the work of closing up this sewer would be taken up as the first thing of all. It was marked No. 1 on the program for the year.

"They never closed it up, however, and convicts who ought to be working on this sewer have been working in other parts of the county, especially on Wesley avenue and on Piedmont avenue."

At the meeting tonight two petitions, one in the state board of health and one in the city board of health, asking the immediate closing of the sewer for reasons of health, will be named around and signed by a large number of the residents. Many names were signed before the meeting.

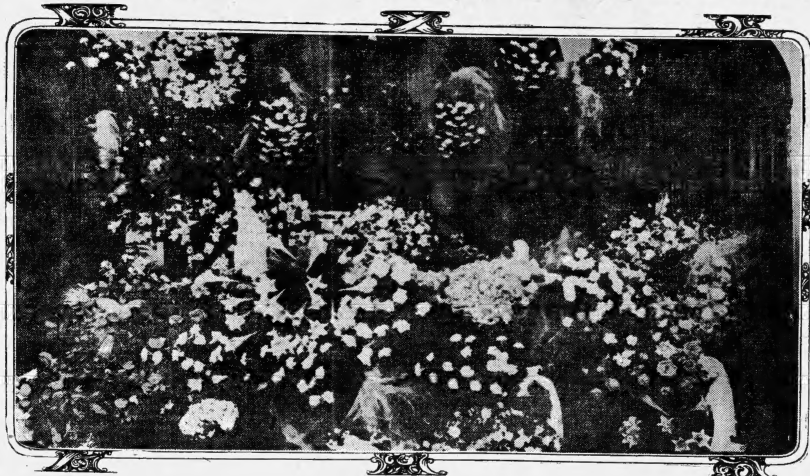

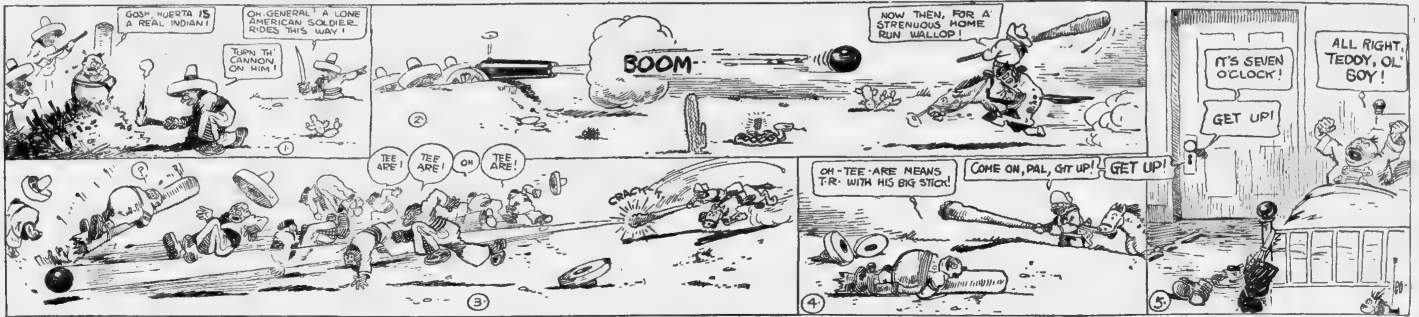

THE SPORTLIGHT BY GRANTLAND RICE

One gurgling forecast, developed in the early spring, is making headway somewhat slowly. It was suggested by a number of authorities that the Feds by raiding a number of clubs had slipped both Giants and Athletics a walk over, and that all interest would soon be lifted from the two championships. If the Giants and Athletics are now in the throes of a walk over, quite a number of us who make daily inspection of the club standings are totally blind. There is every indication that if these two clubs win again it will be after the hardest fight they have known for some time—and it is no sure tip that both will land.

Mack's club, so far, doesn't look to be nearly as robust as it was last season, and at least five American league clubs look to be improved. Detroit, New York, St. Louis, Washington and Boston are all harder clubs to beat, and not one of the five looks to be up there through any mere flash.

When the Tigers left New York they were imbued with a strange yearning. This was to get into Philadelphia and grapple with the Mack-men in a hand-to-hand conflict. Few clubs in past years have had any keen desire to get within short reach of the champs. But the Tigers were on the level with it. They believed that Philadelphia and Washington were the two clubs to beat and they were ready to exchange wallops with both at a moment's notice.

Jennings shared this feeling with his men. "In the old days," he said, "that is five or six years ago, we could always stop Philadelphia when we had to do it. If we needed four straight, we went out and got 'em. I don't know just where my club stands this season until we finish up with Mack and Griffith. ENGLAND'S EDGE

Slipping the devil his due and the lion what is coming his way, there can be no question concerning England's superiority in golf. Albion has us styled and trapped at Scotland's ancient game.

This season America dispatches ten golfing troops to the front, including her amateur and open champion and her star medal player. Not a one of the ten slated beyond the fourth round. Her amateur champion was beaten in his first match and her open champion in his second. In those last four years England has not only repulsed every American invasion with frightful slaughter, but she has done well in her own invasions of American soil. She has us cornered in golf and there's no alibi. There is not only a margin in her favor, but it is a wide one—some beyond any dispute.

Chick Evans at least has consolation left in the fact that the round which brought him defeat would have beaten any golfer alive—Vardon, Braid, Ray or old J. H. Miracle himself.

ON THE DEFENSIVE

Recent developments have now tossed our Uncle Samuel strictly upon the defensive. He is no longer bent upon an invasion or annexing more territory, but faces a righteous war in defense of his own.

He still has three cherished cups reposing on the pantry shelf, but none of the three is chained down beyond recall. This spring has brought him something of a jolt. He has seen three international events run off, and he finds himself with the pallid percentage of .333, which is a good bit to the St. Louis Browns of former years.

Unless he can clean up in polo, tennis and yachting he will be at least one down to England at the finish—and maybe more. It seems a bit tough that such sterling athletes as Cobb, Johnson, Baker, Crawford, etc., are not eligible for the international mix-up. If golf, tennis, polo, etc., can develop all this froth and furor, imagine what an international ball game would bring on with the world series wiper pitted against Britain's best.
