

SENATOR HOKE SMITH FORMALLY ANNOUNCES TO SUCCEED HIMSELF



Statement Breathes Harmony and Good Will for All Georgians, Regardless of Past Affiliations

WASHINGTON, May 28.—In a state not breathing a sigh of harmony and good will for all Georgians, regardless of past affiliations, Senator Hoke Smith today declared he would be a candidate to succeed himself in the United States senate, subject to the democratic primary in August. The statement follows:

"It has hardly seemed necessary for me to make a formal statement of my candidacy for the nomination in August to succeed myself in the senate. Friends who have supported me in past contests, and many who have opposed me, have written me expressing their purpose to support me in the election, and have consented to re-nominate my candidacy as a certainty."

"The newspapers have generalized to the people the facts as to what I have been doing in Washington, and the voters are already, to a large extent, familiar with my efforts to serve the state."

"I would serve all. In the senate it will be my earnest desire to serve all the people and to represent them all to the extent of my ability."

"While I cannot hope to do any more, or to do anything I may do or say, make me no more difficult for any citizen to confer with me, or take up with me matters of importance in which he may be interested."

"The long realized with regret that former political contests resulted as they were obliged to do, in some acrimony and even estrangement, but I am encouraged by what has been said to me by hundreds of those who have opposed me in the past, to believe that bitterness and badness have been forgotten by us, as it has been by them."

"I TRUST ELECTION TO FRIENDS. The people have been very generous to me, and I am anxious to have every citizen of Georgia, no matter what our past relations have been, feel perfectly free to call on me while I am in the senate, to give me their views, and to do so with the full assurance that they will find me friendly and ready to respond to their calls."

"I will not be able to spend any time in Georgia, until after adjournment of congress, which will probably be in October. I shall devote my entire time to my official duties, and must trust no election to my friends and those who support me."

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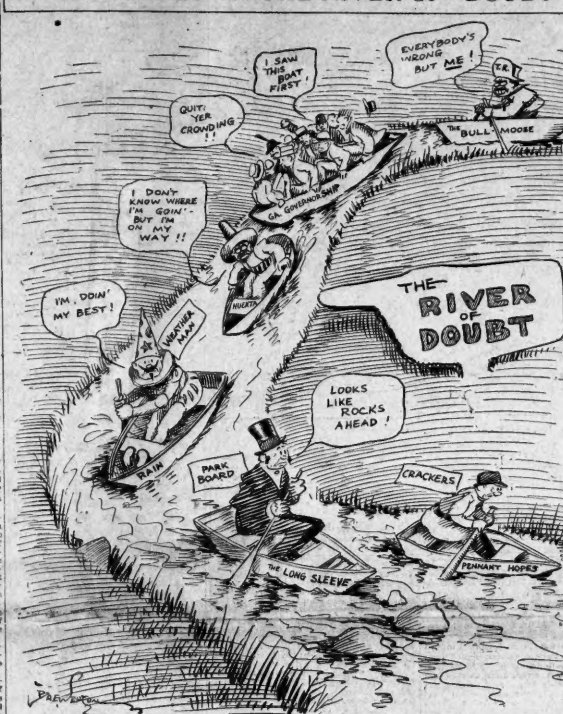

Miss Parrish's report, which is a comprehensive study of the present state of the school system, is a report of the state school supervisor.

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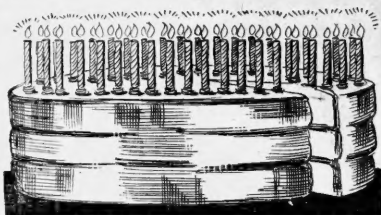
