

DAWSON IS INJURED, PROBABLY FATAL. IN BIG AUTO RACE

Driver and Mechanic Pinned Under Car-Gilhooley's Machine Also Wrecked, and He and Assistant Hurt

DURAY, PRESSED BY GUYOT, IS LEADING AT 150 MILES

French Drivers Closely Following Betting-Americans Are Depending on Durability to Win Against Speed

INDIANAPOLIS, May 29.—Dawson, winner of the 1913 race, was probably fatally injured when his car, 24, turned over and pinned him and his mechanic under it. Both were taken to the field hospital and it was stated that Dawson's back was broken, but that he was later tended by physicians.

The machine was not so badly hurt, however, and was overturned when he tried to avoid Gilhooley's car. Gilhooley's car 49, overturned on the southeast turn and both the driver and the mechanic were taken to the hospital. Both thought to have been seriously injured.

The first hundred miles was completed by the leader, Thompson, at or at the rate of more than 37 miles an hour. Thompson was closely followed by Duray, 14, and Bragg, 21, in the order named.

NUMBER OF DEAD IN SHIP DISASTER NOW IS FIGURED AT 984

Empress of Ireland Carried Down 753 Passengers and 211 of Crew—Only 403 Were Saved

WOMEN AND CHILDREN IN GRIM PILE OF DEAD

Heartrending Scenes Are Witnessed in Rimouski, Where Rescue Ships Unload Bodies of Those Who Perished

(By Associated Press.)
RIMOUSKI, May 29.—According to the latest estimate issued by officials of the Canadian Pacific railway, 984 persons lost their lives when the steamship Empress of Ireland was rammed and sunk by the collier St. Lawrence in the St. Lawrence river early Friday morning.

Of this number 753 were passengers and 211 were crew. The bodies of 403 were saved, the passengers numbered 201 and the crew 202.

With the survivors safe in Quebec, where their wants are being given every possible care, attention was turned today to Rimouski, where efforts to recover the bodies of the victims are in progress. Up to an early hour today 285 bodies had been landed there.

The dead were piled in tiers, making it possible to identify the bodies for purposes of identification. The work was a fearful task, but it was being carried out with the greatest care and efficiency.

SCENE HEARTRENDING
The bodies of the victims were being unloaded from the ships at Rimouski, where the scene was heartrending. The bodies were being identified and the families were being notified.

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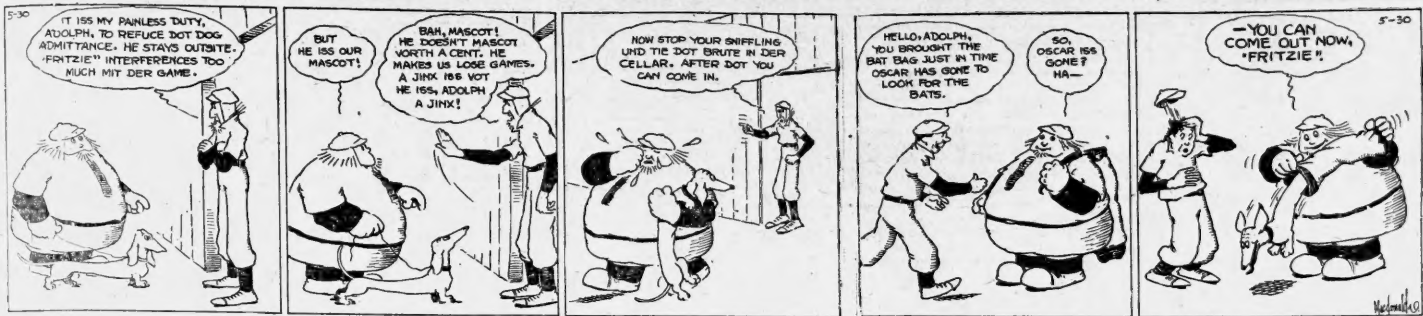

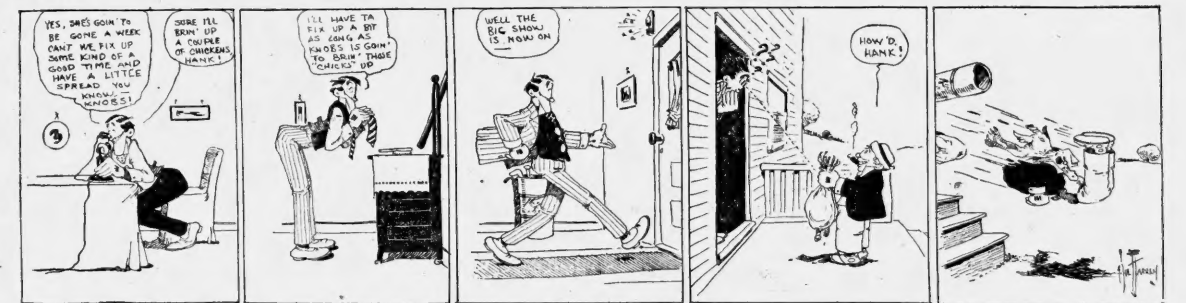

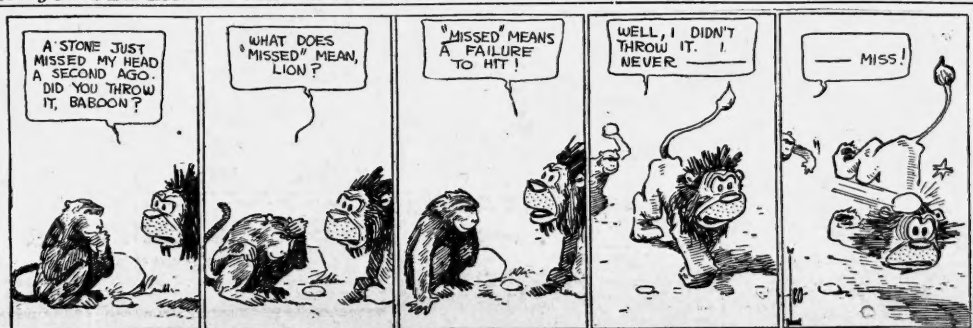
