The supreme court decided against Hickman's appeal, so he was brought before Judge Preston, who is presiding over the criminal branch of the superior court, on Friday and remanded. The judge sentenced the negro to January 25, 1915, instead of January 23, 1915, when the mistake was discovered the negro was brought back and informed of the correct date.

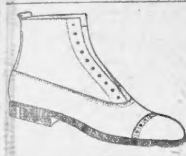

## FREIGHT RATE RAISE WILL ADD \$30,000,000 TO INCOME OF ROADS

(Continued from Page 1.)

freight and through rate increases. The means of transportation are fundamental and indispensable agencies in our industrial life and for the common weal should be kept abreast of public requirements.

**NEW SITUATION PRESENTED.**—When these cases were originally submitted, as also when the original report was prepared, the revenue and expenditure account for June, 1914, and the property investment account for that fiscal year were not available, the war was unforeseen, and the results of our order were, of course, yet to come. Collectively they present a new situation.

The decision granting increased freight rates to the eastern railroads is welcome news," said John M. Glenn, secretary of the Illinois Manufacturers' association, in Chicago today. "The iron and steel industries and the car works will be most affected, but it will tend to give new confidence to every line. A conservative estimate of the amount of goods of all kinds bought directly by the railroads from manufacturers would be \$200,000,000. Approximately 2,000,000 employees in manufacturing plants all over the country will

be affected by the decision."

The railroads are permitted to make the application for advances in rates except the rail-lake-and-rail, lake-and-rail, and rail-and-lake traffic; rates on bituminous coal and coke; rates on anthracite coal and iron ore; and rates that are held by increased orders of the commission.

**PERMITS OTHER ADVANCES.**—After further consideration the commission permits advances to be made also on cement, starch, brick, tile, clay and plaster. On these commodities no advance was permitted by the decision of August 1.

Joint rates between official classification territory and territory south of the Potomac and Ohio and east of the Mississippi may be increased not to exceed 5 per cent.

Interstate rates to and from New England also may be increased not to exceed 5 per cent.

While present existing differentials among various Atlantic points are preserved, the rates between any two of them also may be increased 5 per cent. The application of the eastern roads for a rehearing of the rate case was made on September 15, last, on the ground that the European war and other related reasons had materially changed conditions since the previous decision was given.

The petition for a rehearing stated that it was made in behalf of 112 railroad companies, comprising thirty-five

railroad systems in "official classification territory." It set forth that since the commission's previous decision "facts and circumstances have arisen" warranting a rehearing. Specifically it was stated that since the previous decision, the complete income accounts for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1914, had become available.

**Rate Decision Helps**  
**Weak Stock Market**  
**(By Associated Press)**

**NEW YORK, Dec. 18.**—The decision of the interstate commerce commission came unexpectedly to Wall street at a time when the stock market was acutely weak and helped materially to bring about a general recovery. Prices rose from 1 1/2 to 3 points above the low level of the session. The rally was not fully maintained, prices yielding from fractions to a full point after the short interest had covered. The list soon settled down to further dullness.

WAR CAN'T LOAF HERE**

Lopo Kopulic, arraigned before Recorder Johnson Friday morning on the charge of idling and loitering, said he is an Austrian and left his country at the outbreak of the war because he had no desire to fight.

"I am not a fighting man and I was not paid with anybody," replied Kopulic in his somewhat broken English.

"Well, you'll either have to fight cock at the stockade or get out of Atlanta," said the recorder.

Kopulic said he would get out.
