The Manufacturers' Record offers sound advice when it urges capital to investigate the opportunities for flour mills in Southern States. Evidently there are rich inducements to such enterprise. In the wheat acreage harvested in Georgia amounted to 140,000 acres with an aggregate-yield of 1,680,000 bushels. It is estimated that the wheat acreage in Georgia sown for 1915 is 314,000 acres, an increase of 124 per cent, and that the ensuing cro will total 3,768,000 bushels. This is a wonderfully cheering prospect, but it calls for milling and marke ties which the State now lacks; they musbe forthcoming if the benefits of the increased wheat parvest are duly to be enjoyed; and it is the priv liege of far-sighted capital to supply them

As in Georgia, so in other Southern States, partic niarly in those where heretofore cotton has dom nated farming interests, there is promise of an extraordinary increase in the wheat crop. They realize that present and prospective conditions demand a frastic curtailment of the 1916 cetton acrease and a liberal expansion in food crops. They know that every bale of cotton which is added to the existing surplus will tend to depress prices which already are low, and will threaten them with another cotton

crisis next sutumn. They realize, moreover, that
prices for all manner of foodstuffs will advance under the stimulus of the extraordinary foreign demand brought about by the European war. And so
they are preparing to asfeguard, as far as possible,
the value of the cotton crop new on hand, to rake at
home the necessaries which in the past they have
imported from distant sections, and also to produce
the things for which the world's demand is greatest.
The South is going to raise not only more wheat,
but more corn and cats, more vegetables and live
stock. It is going to abandon the precarious one-crop
plan and onter upon a diversified, well-rounded system of agriculture. Because of this far-reaching




