Alleged Slayer of Mary Phagan Hears Death Sentence Imposed Fourth Time—Reiterates Denial of Guilt

ONLY HOPE NOW LIES IN PLEA FOR PARDON

State Prison Board and the Governor to Pass on Petition to Commute Sentence to Life Imprisonment

San Francisco, May 10.—Frank Monday morning at 11:30 o'clock received from Judge Ben H. Hill, of Fulton superior court, his fourth sentence to be hanged for the murder of Mary Phagan.

Frank, June 22, was freed by Judge Hill as the date for the execution of the sentence. Friday has been the day of the week in each of Frank's previous sentences.

Mrs. Frank, the condemned man's wife, was at his side in the court room when sentence was passed. It was the first time she has attempted the ordeal. She sat until Frank started out of the court room. Then she broke down and cried.

People began entering Judge Hill's court room at 8:30 o'clock Monday morning. By 9 o'clock the court room was full and the doors were closed.

From 9 o'clock until 11:30, the hour announced for the passing of sentence, change had mobilized to prevent, possibly, if necessary, the entry of any German who might be brave enough to attempt to make their way into the house in disregard of the warning issued by the stock exchange committee.

DEMAND FOR 'WILFUL WHOLESALE MURDER'

WASHINGTON, May 10.—President Bernstorff, the German ambassador, today expressed in person to Secretary Bryan the deep regret that the events of the war had led to the loss of so many American lives. The phrase used was "wilful wholesale murder."

ASSERTS COURTS INCLINE TO FAVOR CORPORATIONS

Justice Clark, of North Carolina, Gives Reasons for Cause of Industrial Unrest

(By Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, May 10.—The courts are too much inclined to favor corporations in litigation with the people, according to Justice Clark, chief justice of the North Carolina supreme court, in a statement today before the industrial relations commission.

Justice Clark was the first witness called in the commission's investigation of the relation of the courts to labor law. Other prominent bar leaders followed him on the stand.

"What is responsible for the apparent reluctance of laboring men as individuals and labor organizations to bring issues to the courts?" Justice Clark was asked.

"My observation is," he replied, "that as a rule the courts are slow to adopt progressive economic ideas and advance legislation enacted. Courts ordinarily are composed of elderly men, and they, as lawyers, have been employed by great corporations, and when they reach the bench they are unconsciously biased by the views they held at the bar."

"How can this be modified?"

"Only by the slow process of education and development of public opinion. As older men pass away, their places on the bench may be taken by younger men imbued with progressive ideas of the times."

Justice Clark referred to a child labor decision in North Carolina, in which he held a corporation responsible for injury to an eight-year-old child.

"This decision was in advance of existing law," he said. "I took the ground that we must consider economic conditions and decide it on the ground of justice and common sense."

The witness then referred to the Danbury haters' decision and similar cases recently decided. He declared labor should have the same right to organize that capital has, and that "there is no reason why labor should be held collectively responsible."

"Corporation of power by the courts of any department of government," he added, "is a legitimate cause for unrest among any sovereign people."

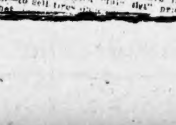
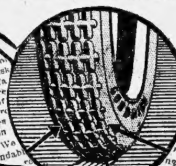

Present Importance of Georgia Drained Lands

The forthcoming meeting of the Georgia Drainage congress which will be held at Albany this week reveals the vital importance of the reclamation of Georgia's inundated lands to the progress of the commonwealth. The congress was organized four years ago and already the advances it has made in achieving the purposes for which it was formed have been noteworthy. Beneficial laws have been enacted. Much, however, still remains to be done. What this consists of is indicated in a recent statement of A. R. Lawton, president of the congress, who said:

We need more money and must present a united front to perfect the law and give encouragement to the utilization of Georgia's large acreage of overflowed lands, rich in agricultural possibilities, but now useless for want of state reclamation and co-operative effort.

There is one consideration just now that reveals very clearly the urgency of making the state's swamp lands available for productive uses. This consideration lies in the fact that after the end of the European war this country and especially the south will receive large numbers of desirable immigrants who will come here to escape the burdens of life in war-torn countries and who will wish to begin life under more favorable auspices than they have now. These immigrants will be a large contribution to the volume of the productive acreage of the state. These reclaimed tracts would mean just that much more homeless lands which could be offered to landless people.

The state's swamp lands are the most fertile within its borders. They need only the removal of the water to make them yield fruitage to their utmost possibilities. And it takes only drainage to make them happy, healthful dwelling places.

The possibility of more lands through drainage and the certainty of more people here through the results of the war are well-nigh indented.

Recent reports of the department of labor show that immigration has fallen off 75 per cent because of the war, the lowest infow of immigrants for seven years. But just as soon as the war closes all this will be changed and the coming of peoples of the highest type will amount to surprising totals. They will represent a vast source of wealth. Our inundated lands of all kinds also represent a source of great potential wealth. Bring the two together and the wealth will be made real.

The Georgia Drainage congress and its aims and purposes should have the earnest support and co-operation of every citizen who has the good of his state and its progress at heart.

Now is the time for all good men to get busy in their gardens.

Quite a Different Sort of Moonshine

The governor of that state has asked all citizens on that day to join in a campaign for the establishment of "Moonlight Schools" for the reduction of adult illiteracy. The schools get their name from the fact that they will be held at night in order that the grown-ups may devote the day to making a living may utilize the early hours of the evening for the purpose of securing the beginning of an education.

Alabama as well as a number of other southern states, including Georgia, has attained an unenviable eminence for the number of its illiterates. The moonlight schools were tried in Kentucky with notable success in reducing the number of unlettered citizens in that commonwealth. It is gratifying to note that Alabama is preparing to put the plan in execution.

Our public schools are doing a wonderful work. They are showing themselves, especially in recent times, readily adaptive to changing conditions. So much has been left undone in the past that it is

apparent that the service they now render must be supplemented in many ways. Where there is no compulsory school attendance law, large numbers of boys and girls pass every year beyond the school age and go on to become a swell of the moonlight schools. For reaching these the moonlight school is indeed an effective means. Herein is constituted quite a different sort of distillation of moonlight from that popularly known as "moonshine." It represents not a destroyer of manhood and a bar to progress but a builder for the betterment of mankind.

A Bit of Contrast

This thought is incident to perusing the accounts of the meeting of the Southern Sociological congress now in session at Houston, Texas. This organization whose motto is "The Solid South for a Better Nation" has in the past been directing its endeavors into social and economical channels but has now concentrated its efforts upon a health crusade.

Explained in the news dispatches, the objective at the Houston meeting is represented by one word, health—personal, community and national health and physical, mental, moral and social health. The subject of one of the speakers was, "A Worthy Substitute for War—the War Against Disease."

Here is revealed some of the leading minds of the South with every thought and energy bent toward conserving life. With them and with men of their kind every invention and every new method that aids in making some of the greatest evils received with rejoicing. And now the contrast. War brings nations to such a pass that human life is nothing and with them the ablest minds are ever alert for its destruction, and the slaughter of human beings is acclaimed with joy.

The international situation of course cannot be cleared up until the commencement orators offer the proper solution.

It might be well for amateur war counselors to consider that perhaps President Wilson and his advisers are a little better equipped than anybody else to consider the situation.

An Ex-President's Service

It is apparent that ex-President Taft is more appreciated today than at any time in his career. His administration as president in many ways and for many causes was not a success. But the innate worth of the man has clearly shone forth since he left the presidential chair.

In the trying days that have been before President Wilson in meeting the vexing questions of neutrality that arise almost daily there has come from Mr. Taft no word of carping criticism, no pointing out of this or that as being amiss, with the implication that if only he were president things would have been done differently and all would be well. That has been the role played by Roosevelt, our other ex-president.

"Not only has Mr. Taft refrained from useless and merely mischievous criticism of the present administration in its dealings with foreign nations, but he has given the administration, even though it represents a party not his own, unwavering support."

Speaking of the recent commendation by Mr. Taft of President Wilson and the latter's neutrality policy, the New York World says:

Mr. Taft's commendation reflects great credit on Mr. Wilson but it reflects equally great credit on Mr. Taft. There is a fine and wholesome patriotism about it that carries a lesson to everybody. In a crisis like this, Mr. Taft is trying to help and not to hinder. It is to be true an American to be a partisan on issues that a loyal citizen should treat as partisan and this is one of the most important public services that a former president can render to his country.

And only last Saturday when he was asked to comment on the sinking of the Lusitania, Mr. Taft did not break into a long harangue prefacing it with abuse of the president but on the contrary he said:

I do not wish to embarrass the president or the administration by a discussion of the subject at this stage of the information except to express confidence that the president will follow a wise and patriotic course.

In expressing these words Mr. Taft also clearly expressed what caliber man he is.

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THE COAST GUARD IN WAR

THE United States is preparing a new defensive force for use in time of war. This force is to grow out of the coast guard, which was created by the act of congress combining two historic agencies of the government—the revenue cutter service and the life saving service. The duties of these two agencies of the coast line, both romantic and heroic, and occupying warm places in the hearts of the people, are to be kindred lines. In fact, they overlapped so frequently that it was thought advisable to put them under a common head.

Might not this agency, which was so well equipped for the lookout for ships in distress, also keep its weather eye open for the vessels of an enemy? 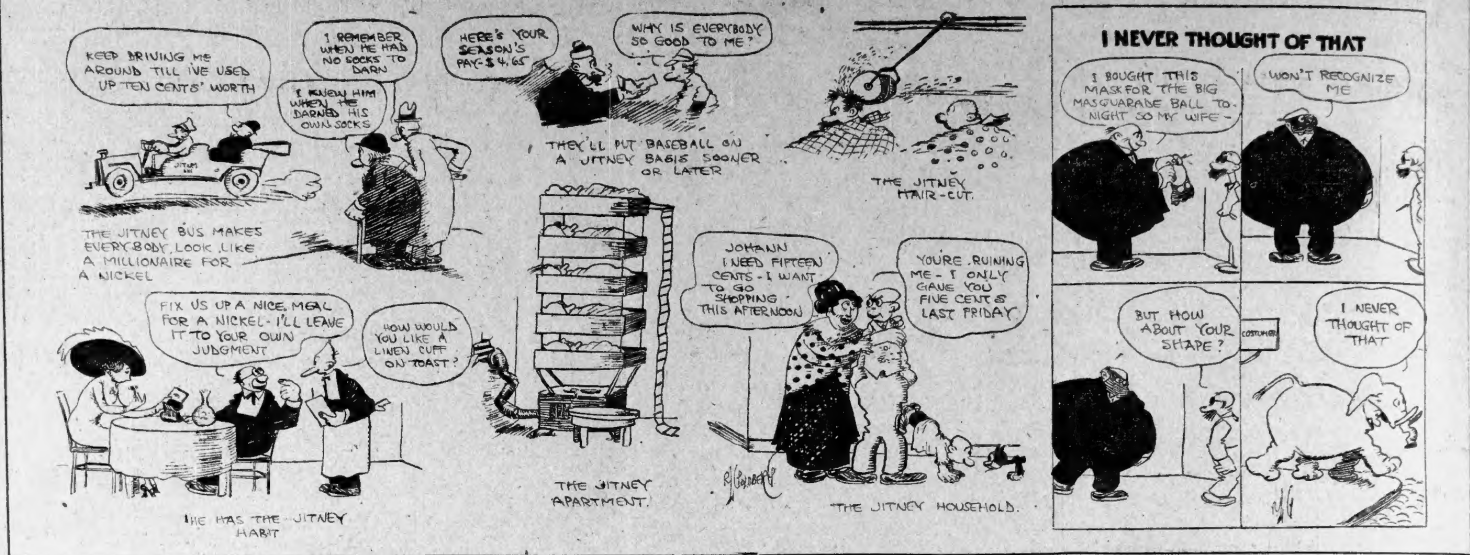

Frank rose when Judge Hill concluded, and walked out of the prisoners' dock through which he entered, accompanied by Sheriff Mangum and Attorney Rose and Alexander.

Attorney Hays remained behind with Mrs. Frank. She watched her husband through the dock. There she gave way and sobbed while her husband's cheeks, Attorney Hays and her friend looked on, one on each side of her, and through the iron-barred gate of the jail and were lost to public view.

The meeting of Frank Monday marks the final chapter in his court fight for life. There is no further appeal to the courts which he can make. He has appealed to the supreme court of Georgia and the supreme court of the United States, and both these courts have declined to grant him the execution of the trial jury's verdict.

Frank's last remaining hope of escaping the gallows now rests with the state prison board and the Governor. Already the governor's board has received a petition for a commutation of the sentence of the trial jury's verdict.

With the fixing of June 22 as the date for the execution of Frank's sentence, it became certain that Governor Slaton would be called upon to pass upon the plea of the case.

Governor Slaton does not go out of office until Saturday, June 19, after the date fixed by Judge Hill for Frank's execution. Therefore, he has no other pass upon Frank's application for a commutation to life imprisonment or grant of his reprieve.

Should the prison commission delay action on Frank's petition for commutation until after June 22, Governor Slaton will, without doubt, be asked to reprieve the condemned man for a sufficient period to allow the prison commission and Governor Phil N. H. Harris to consider the petition.

On the other hand, should the prison commission go ahead and dispose of the case.
